## Prince County Begins Digging Itself Out

SUMMERSIDE — Prince County residents are gradually digging themselves out from under one of the worst storms of the winter which dumped 9.1 inches of snow in this area since early Friday morning. This end of the province has now received 103.3 inches of snow this winter compared to 90.5 at the end of February last year.

The storm, assisted by winds of 42 miles per hour with occasional gusts to 52, created havoc with highway traffic, bringing it to a virtual standstill early Saturday.

Visibility at that time was almost nil due to the heavy drifting. An IMT bus running between Tignish and Charlottetown was scheduled to leave Summerside for the capital city at approximately 10 a.m. and was held up here until approximately four o'clock in the afternoon.

The mainline bus was three hours late arriving here yesterday but this was attributed to poor driving conditions on the mainline.

Captain E. R. Pike, marine superintendent at Borden, stated the ferries had no difficulties crossing the strait yesterday and that traffic was light, both coming to and leaving the island on both sides.

Plow dispatchers all have reported main highways open. Some have been widened but there are still a number of narrow cuttings. A number of second roads have been opened and the remainder will be cleared today.

Accidents were also investigated by the Borden and Summerside RCMP detachments and most of them were attributed to the driving conditions.

The Summerside detachment investigated four accidents. Saturday morning at 1:40 the RCMP were called to an accident on the Military Road leading to the airport. Involved were a 1963 model car driven by Terry Wayne Dowd of the RCAF Station and George M. Donovan of Summerside. Damage was estimated at \$150.

At 7:30 a.m. Ralph Compton Owen of Kensington, driving a 1966 model, was in collision with a 1965 model car driven by Donald Clarence Marchbank of New Annan. Damage in this instance was \$200.

Later in the day at Travelers Rest a 1960 model driven by Barry George Chappell of Summerside was involved in an accident with a 1962 model driven by Warren Marlo Breckley of the local force base.

Yesterday afternoon at 2:30 a 1963 half-ton truck driven by William Edward Thornton of St. Eleanor's was in collision with a car driven by Elvin Moyses of West Devin with total damage being \$100.

The Borden detachment investigated a few minor accidents.

material blanketing the lunar surface.

They said disagreement could be expected "at the edge of knowledge" and predicted there could be no solution until future space ships make soft landings to analyze the surface.

LONDON (Reuters)—The Soviet Union Saturday hurled three unmanned satellites into space from one booster rocket—the second time Russia has done this in six months.

The sputniks—Cosmos 54, 55 and 56—carried scientific instruments to probe outer space, the Soviet news agency Tass reported.

In August, three similar sputniks—Cosmos 35, 36 and 40 were put into orbit by a single rocket. The Cosmos satellites—the first was launched in March, 1962—are designed to study the upper strata of the atmosphere and outer space with the aim of acquiring a fuller knowledge of how to overcome the hazards of manned space-flight.
