

Succeeds Husband As Head Of New York Stock Brokers

MONTRÉAL (CP) — Wives, don't close your ears if your husband wants to talk about his business.

If you listen, you might learn enough to take over his job.

This what happened to Josephine Perfect Bay, widow of a former president of a New York stock brokers' house, who died two years ago. Today, without planning it, Mrs. Bay finds herself president and chairman of the firm, A. M. Kidder and Company—the first woman in Wall Street's history to hold such a post.

On a recent tour of the company's branches in Montreal and Toronto she was hailed enthusiastically by managers and salesmen. In public she keeps her financial acumen in the background. Tall and straight, she wears flowered hats.

And to husbands, she gives this advice: "Teach your wife to handle her own affairs, to write cheques, plan family spending, and prepare for some gainful occupation. Help her to understand the stock market and your investments. Introduce her to your banker, broker, insurance man and lawyer."

She believes most women have a flair for business detail.

If they can learn not to think their emotions—their principal fault in business women can be as influential as men," says Mrs. Bay.
