LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

THE MILLS MISSION. Sir,—My connection with the executive committee appointed to make arrangements for the impending visit of the Rev. B. Fay Mills to this city compels me to contradict the erroneous statements made by correspondents of THE EXAMINER in its issue of last Saturday. The guarantee fund now being raised in anticipation of the coming of Mr. Mills will be devoted entirely to paying the expenses of the evangelist, the cost of printing and advertising, and other incidental expenses. Mr. Mills will not receive one cent of this money, nor will collections be taken at any of his meetings. The only remuneration that he consents to accept will consist of free-will offerings sent to him privately by any individuals who may wish to express in this way their gratitude for any spiritual benefits that they may have derived from his visit. Not a single one of the promoters has so far come out and given any pledge, promise or guarantee that it will, yet the electors are asked by some parties unknown to adopt the Act. The ministers of several of the churches have spoken in favor of it as in duty bound they were. But it is not to be expected that they are going to carry it out. When the Act was law before it was not enforced, except on rare occasions, i. e., before a Scott Act contest, but in the interval it was free for the buying. From 1881 to 1884 it was supported by all the newspapers of the city, as well as by all the clergymen, including the late Rev. George Hodgson and the late Rev. Father McGilvray—Protestant and Catholic alike; but although these two clergymen undertook the personal enforcement of the Act, they gave it up as impossible. From 1884 to 1887 the Act was still supported by all the clergymen, Catholic and Protestant alike, and all the newspapers and a City Council were still in its favor, besides a public paid prosecutor. But it could not be enforced. From 1887 to 1891 the act was still in force. Owing to its total failure it lost many friends, including the late Bishop McIntyre, whose temperance views were the source of strength to all temperance contests, and yourself, MR. EXAMINER, who were not afraid to tell the truth and recede from your former position. We are now asked to bring the law back, and with all its disgraceful consequences. But if it could not be enforced with all the power and strength that it had from 1881 to 1891, how on earth can it be expected that it will be enforced in the future when it will have arrayed against it the present opposition. It is the height of folly to expect that any summary law can be enforced if there is only a bare majority in its favor, and if the act is carried by such a narrow majority that it will be worse than useless to attempt to enforce it. It is not unreasonably to ask the supporters of the Act to come out over their own signature and pledge themselves personally to enforce the Act in case of its adoption. The electors have been deceived too often to accept generalities from a body.

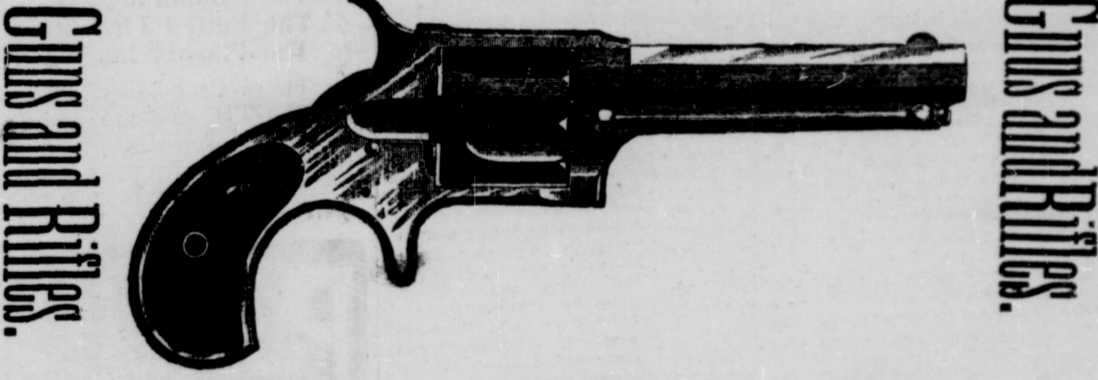

The foreign mail closes at the city post office at nine o'clock (local) this evening to go by the tug William Atkins to Cape Tormentine, leaving Charlotte town at four o'clock to-morrow morning.

POLICE COURT.—This forenoon, Alice Connolly pleaded guilty to the charge of selling intoxicants on Sunday, and was fined \$100 and costs, which she paid. A charge against George Offer of selling intoxicants during the prohibited hours, was required into, and in the absence of a material witness was adjourned until Wednesday. The case of John Bolger, who is charged with selling intoxicants in a room having more than one entrance, was also adjourned until Wednesday to enable the defendant to produce witnesses in his behalf. Jane Thorpe, charged with assaulting John Yeo with a bottle, "inflicting grievous bodily harm," did not respond to the summons, and a warrant was ordered to issue and the hearing of her case adjourned until her apprehension.

LARCENY.—A warrant has been issued for the arrest of William Wainwright and his brother Benjamin, who live on Upper Queen Street, for the larceny of several articles from different houses in the eastern end of the city. A search warrant was served out by Marshal Cannon, and Sergeant Brantley, accompanied by Officer Campbell, on Friday last proceeded to search their premises. Articles belonging to several city parties were found in the house, including a child's buffalo, belonging to R. F. Farquharson; a coat belonging to a boy named McLeod, living on King St. east, an accordion, owned by Wm. Bastian, which was taken from the residence of Mr. Miller, Prince St.; a wrap belonging to Chief Justice Sullivan; a water-proof coat and a small shooting coat. The two brothers have fled to the country.

Sir,—I have not heretofore agreed with many of your editorials regarding the working of the Scott Act in Charlottetown, but I agree generally with your article of Saturday last. The temperance people have made many mistakes, I admit, but no greater one than their conduct since the last election. For over three years we have not had a public temperance meeting, and no attempt whatever has been made to educate the electors to again favorably consider the Scott Act, but so soon as the three years pass a temperance crusade is started. This is exactly what the opponents of the Act have always thrown in our faces, viz., that we neither act nor preach temperance except just before an election, and therefore the people, having given us many previous chances to show our sincerity and ability to enforce the Act, in 1891 decided that we could not be trusted and repealed the law. We have again fallen into the same line of conduct which settled the Act before. We again ask the people to support us. But, as you say, we have given no guarantee that the Act, if adopted, will be enforced. The people refused to believe us in 1891, and I doubt if they will believe us now.

TEMPERANCE.

THE PRESENT LAW.

Sir,—The Rev. Mr. Fullerton, in St. James' Church, yesterday evening, during the course of his sermon, in no uncertain way, but in very strong and unqualified language, denounced the present liquor law of this city. The reverend gentleman, being a comparative stranger here, and being a member of the present Act is the measure prepared and passed by the extreme temperance party of Charlottetown, and is not the act of either the liquor dealers or the opponents of the Scott Act. The object of the law was to punish those who, last election, voted conscientiously against the Scott Act, and who desired a license law under strong restriction. This extreme measure would not consent to, but instead gave the present act for the express and avowed purpose of giving the people a sickening of the rum traffic. Mr. Fullerton, therefore, unconsciously gave these temperance people a hard rap.

CHURCH WORK.

Sir,—In this morning's "Guardian" the Rev. Mr. Hamlyn corroborates my statement of Saturday, namely that "the sum of four hundred dollars had to be guaranteed to pay the two assistants and their expenses while here. For his own share Mr. Mills depends on the generosity of the people." Now what it matters very little in what way Mr. Mills looks for his pay. He cannot be expected to work for nothing. Conductor Mc Kay made better wages in Charlottetown than he could have done in his proper calling. My contention is that this money can be better expended in our own church work.

A WORD TO MINISTERS.

Sir,—We have a good many ministers in this city. Why cannot they do their own work? They are continually importing evangelists to convert their congregations for them; and show they must import temperance orators to make their people vote for the Scott Act. If they consider themselves incapable, why don't they pay for these imported gentlemen out of the very fair salaries they are themselves receiving, instead of taxing their flocks for these extra expenses.

A SUGGESTION FOR TAXATION?

Sir,—Will you ask Mr. Peters, while taxing other denturals, to put a tax on all bachelors over 30 years of age. Perhaps if he did so some of us would have a chance of getting married.

SHALL THE ACT BE ENFORCED?

Sir,—The promoters of the Scott Act are again asking the citizens of Charlottetown for another trial of the Act, and the question and perhaps the sole one for the electors to consider, is, Will the Scott Act, if adopted, be enforced?
