The steamer Bonavista is loading coal at Pictou for Montreal. She will arrive here on Monday for freight and passengers. The Toronto conference of the Methodist Church, has elected Rev. Dr. Sutheiland President, and Rev. J. Griffith Secretary. The annual examination of the Model School will take place on Tuesday next, at 10 o'clock. The public are invited to attend. [June 21] FRANK WELSH, a boy about fourteen years old, son of Michael Welsh, of Upper Sackville, was drowned Wednesday evening in Morice's Pond. The Rev. J. W. Wadman and his bride arrived here via Pictou last evening. Mr. Wadman has, we learn, accepted an invitation to the Methodist Church at Carleton, St. John, N. B. GRAND TRUNK Railway receipts last week were \$307,000, a decrease of \$60,000 compared with the corresponding period last year. During twenty four weeks the decrease has been \$960,000. MR. HIRAM WIER, of the Halifax Herald, and wife, arrived last evening from Halifax. They left for Georgetown this morning to attend the obsequies of the late Mrs. Gordon, wife of Hon. D. Gordon and mother of Mrs. Wier. NEARLY all the prominent oarsmen of America have signed a memorial "boycotting" Courtney. They look upon him as a "black sheep," and claim that he has done more to disgust people with sculling than any other man that ever sat in a boat. AS OTTAWA despatch says that William Smith, Deputy of the Marine Department, has received a letter from Admiral Bayfield, thanking the Government for naming the Georgian Bay surveying steamer after him. Bayfield's charts from surveys made by him in 1823 and 1825 have been of incalculable service to the shipping of the great lakes for sixty years. DR. STRICKLAND writes to the New York Evening Telegram, to express his amazement and indignation at the fact that in New York a man has been "imprisoned for over five years through a base trick which the court must have favored." The doctor is exerting himself to procure for the incarcerated man the right of a public trial. That he should have to do so in the land of the free is surprising; but having to do it, it is not surprising that he is doing it with his might. No doubt, he will succeed. SAYS the St. John Sun,—"Prince Edward Island is to have shipped about \$300,000 worth of eggs last year. It is calculated that the price realized for the egg product was fully equal to the outlay for wheat flour imported into the Island. This shows to what large results in the aggregate a trade in small and widely scattered products may attain. The money thus brought into the Island found its way into almost every home, and became generally helpful. Prince Edward is a beautiful and exceptional fertile little Island, and the richness of its soil is only surpassed by the genial hospitality of its people. THE firm of Fleming & Merriam, the fund "W" sharks, of Chicago, has come to grief. John Fleming, the head of the firm, and Frank Loring, a "silent" partner, have each been sentenced to a year in the penitentiary and a fine of \$500. Fleming is described as a handsome, heavily-built man, tipping the scales at 250 pounds. He looks quite picturesque in his prison uniform. This firm, it will be remembered, advertised extensively in the Island papers last year. They offered to take charge of any moneys with which they might be favored for the purpose of investment in wheat and other stocks, guaranteeing the party investing handsome profits. We hope there are no Islanders among their victims. REFERRING to the lamented death of the wife of the Hon. Daniel Gordon—which was announced yesterday, the Halifax Herald says: "A telegram received yesterday conveyed the sad intelligence of the death of the wife of the Hon. Daniel Gordon, M. P. of Georgetown. Miss Gordon was married to Hiram Wier only ten days ago. On the morning of the wedding, Mrs. Gordon was seized with a paralytic stroke, the third within a comparatively short time, which resulted fatally. She was an estimable lady of middle age, but had been an invalid and a great sufferer for some time. Ten days ago Mrs. Wier left her home a happy bride. This morning, accompanied by her husband, she returns to be present at the last sad rites over the remains of her mother. She has the deep sympathy of a large circle of friends in her sad bereavement." A LITTLE daughter of Mr. A. C. Parsons, who resides on the corner of Gratton and Weymouth streets, had an almost miraculous escape from a horrible death, about seven o'clock last evening. The little girl was at play with other children on the opposite side of the street, and started to run across in the direction of her home, when she came in contact with a horse driven by Capt. McMillan. The force of the concussion knocked her insensible, and she fell directly in front of the horse, which was, fortunately, going very slowly at the time. The noble animal, fully realizing the necessity for caution, picked his steps so carefully that he did not touch the little girl. Her father, who was an eyewitness to the accident, though unable to prevent it, rushed over and picked up the insensible form of the child, and carried it into the house. Medical aid was at once summoned, and it was ascertained that, beyond a severe shaking up, the little girl was comparatively uninjured.

It was taken at Marie, on the Quebec side.—Advenne. THE Winnipeg papers are jubilant over the crop prospects in the Northwest. In Southern Manitoba the growth is far ahead of last year's. It is estimated that there will be nearly 4,000,000 bushels of wheat for export next fall. The improved outlook is good for business, but bad for grumblers. Of this class the number in the Northwest is fortunately rapidly diminishing. THE Black Diamond Line steamer Coban, Capt. Fraser, arrived from Montreal this afternoon, with a cargo of merchandise for this port and Pictou. She will sail for Pictou this evening, will load coal for Montreal, and call at this port en route for that place on Wednesday next. The Coban will not make a trip to Newfoundland this time. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

General Gordon.

LONDON, June 20. In the House of Commons, to-day, Lord FitzMaurice, Under Foreign Secretary, stated that the latest news received from General Gordon was of date of April 12th. He said that twenty messengers had been sent to General Gordon by different routes, one of whom had been killed.

Contempt of Court.

LONDON, June 21. It is expected that Wm. O'Brien, M. P., will be committed to prison, for contempt of court, in refusing to pay the £500 fine imposed on him on Wednesday. The Irish members of the House of Commons will thereupon raise a debate as a question of privilege upon the action of the court.

Firearms Discovered at Cork.

CORK, June 20. A quantity of revolvers, rifles and ammunition has been found buried near Cork military barracks. The arms have been recently removed from a house in Cork and buried for safety. The clue which led to their discovery was furnished by an informer.

Wall Street Again Excited.

NEW YORK, June 20. Wall street is in a state of wild excitement over the failure of Commodore Garrison, reputed to have been worth nearly \$20,000,000. His assets are about \$15,000, with liabilities about \$2,000,000.

The Suez Canal to be Widened.

PARIS, June 20. The committee appointed to consider the advisability of widening the Suez Canal, or building a second one parallel with the present one, have decided on the former plan.

A Heavy Libel Suit.

MONTREAL, June 21. Hon. Mr. Mercier has entered an action for \$25,000 damages against Le Minerve and its editor, Tasse, for alleged libel.

The Lord Chief Justice Seriously Ill.

LONDON, June 20. Lord Chief Justice Coleridge is seriously ill.

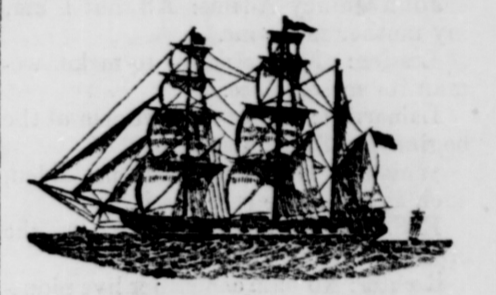
