## Crop Payment Figures Given

SASKATOON (CP) — Final crop payment to Western Canadian grain farmers will be considerably below that of last year, C. E. Gordon Earl, executive director of the Saskatchewan Farmers Union annual convention.  
He expressed little doubt the final crop payment for 1964-65 would be "considerably less than the \$272,000,000 paid out in the final payment for the 1963-64 crop year."  
Mr. Earl said during a question period following his speech that while it would be less he did not think it would be below \$200,000,000.  
He said the current crop year is shaping up as a banner year, the results of which may challenge many of the records established in 1963-64 "that once-in-a-lifetime year."

## FB-111 Bomber Gets LBJ Okay

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP)—President Johnson has given the go-ahead for a new high-speed bomber to cost an estimated \$1,750,000,000 by the time 210 of them are in operation by 1971.  
To be known as the FB-111, it will be a modification of the F-111, the controversial fighter once called the TFX.  
The U.S. defence department's civilian and military chiefs conferred with Johnson for more than three hours at his ranch near Johnson City. Defence Secretary Robert S. McNamara later told a press conference here about plans for the new bomber.  
McNamara said the FB-111 will fly twice as fast as the latest model of the B-52, have equal range and far greater capacity to penetrate enemy territory. The latest B-52 has a speed of about 650 miles an hour and 9,000-mile range.  
He told of plans for the new bomber when asked for his comment on criticism by members of Congress and others of his decision to retire 425 older B-52s over the next few years. "They spoke too soon," McNamara said.  
McNamara said the next session of Congress will be asked to authorize the entire \$1,750,000,000 FB-111 program. He declined to estimate how fast the money will be spent.  
He said the first of the new bombers will be in operation in 1968 with all to be ready by 1971.

McNamara said the FB-111 would be capable of both strategic and tactical missions and equipped to carry either nuclear or conventional bombs. He placed its load capacity at 50 high-explosive bombs weighing 750 pounds each.  
McNamara said the U.S. bomber force now is four times that of the Soviet Union and that he foresees no material change in this ratio of superiority at least through the next decade.  
He said the U.S. now has 600 heavy bombers and that the total will drop to about 465 by the end of the decade. The force then will be made up of 255 late-model B-52s, retained in service, plus the 210 new F-111s.  
General Dynamics Corp. builds the F-111 in its plant in Fort Worth, Tex. McNamara said this company, together with the current sub-contractors, will build the new bomber.  
McNamara disclosed that the United States now has 180,000 troops in Viet Nam, the highest official figure yet announced, but declined to discuss any further buildup of forces there.  
He described bombings of North Viet Nam as justified from a military point of view. The cost of fighting the war appears to be running at the rate of about \$6,000,000,000 a year—about \$16,500,000 daily—and is expected to rise in direct proportion to increased U.S. participation.

**\$3,000 Per Year Described Minimum For Family Of Four**  
OTTAWA (CP) — A Nova Scotia study says those making less than \$3,000 a year can't devote more than 80¢ a month to housing without depriving themselves of food and other necessities.  
The \$3,000 figure is considered by a federal-provincial conference on poverty, now meeting here, as the minimum a family of four can get by on.  
The study by the Nova Scotia municipal affairs department says poor housing tends to create poverty and to negate the effect of efforts to end poverty.  
It said a present low-rental public housing program under federal-provincial administration is limited to usefulness. Projects tended to be large, resulting in a concentration of low-income families and "social stigma." The projects were not popular. And they cost too much for the poor.

**USE LOCAL STANDARDS**  
Less expensive public housing was needed, "especially in smaller communities where the present standard of public housing would almost be in the luxury range." Local standards and materials should be used.  
Rentals paid by families with the lowest income would have to represent a much smaller portion of their income, meaning higher subsidies. The provincial standard of 25 per cent of income was out of the question for these people.  
The paper said Nova Scotia's housing commission is being replaced by an agency to spearhead new programs.
