Wireless Tower Demolished; Is End of Era

CHATHAM, Mass. (AP) — The end came to a giant steel tower on windswept Cape Cod Friday, finishing a career which saved men's lives on the sea of the world.

The 356-foot radio tower of marine coastal radio station WCC at Chatham, erected 40 years ago, was cut down by a workman's acetylene torch.

An onrushing electronics technology, making such ponderous towers unnecessary, doomed the lofty landmark. Long a part of the network of marine coastal stations of the Radiomarine Corporation of America, its life marked an entire epoch of radio communication.

Built originally to receive signals from Europe it later handled messages from ships on all seas.

Topping a hill, its lights 477 feet above the North Atlantic blinked a friendly greeting to sea captains 40 miles away.

Built in 1914, it carried its share of tragic dash-dot-dash conversations. It talked with the great German dirigibles — the "Graf Zeppelin" and the ill-fated "Hindenburg." It chatted with Admiral Byrd at the lonely South Pole.

Its voice whispered in the ear of Charles A. Lindbergh the weather information he needed when he made history—flying alone across the North Atlantic. It carried a continuous story of Howard Hughes' round-the-world race against time in 1938, and later round-the-world cipher services.

Sick and injured persons on ships at sea recovered through medical aid gleaned from its free medical advice service. It relayed distress calls which sent steamships plowing through storms to the aid of stricken craft.

Among the grimmest memories carried by the old tower is that of the Raifuku Maru, Japanese grain ship, a quarter-century ago.

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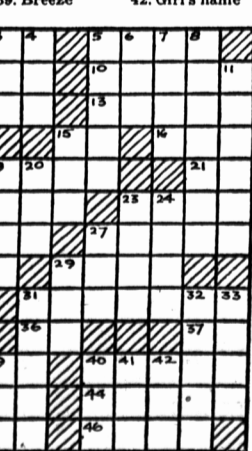
