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THE UNITED STATES ARMY

General Corbin Reports on its Strength and Distribution.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—The annual report of the Adjutant General of the Army Brigade, General Corbin, to the Secretary of War, has been made public. General Corbin sums up the military forces now in the service as follows: Regular army, 64,568; volunteers, 34,574; total, 99,169. The regular establishment consists of ten regiments of cavalry, seven of artillery and twenty five of infantry. The volunteer establishment consists of one regiment of cavalry, twenty-four of infantry and a Porto Rico battalion.

The distribution of these troops up to September last was as follows: In the United States, 34,229; Porto Rico, 3,363; Cuba, 11,187; Philippines, 32,315; en route to the Philippines, 17,099; Alaska, 499; Hawaiian Islands, 466.

General Corbin adds the following to the summary: "It is expected that by December first next all the infantry regiments and United States volunteers, shown above as in the United States, will have sailed for the Philippine Islands. These with the troops now there will give a total strength of 2,117 officers and 63,608 enlisted men.

The report dwells on the courtesies shown our troops by the British Government officials, while stopping at Gibraltar and elsewhere en route to the Philippines, and says this international courtesy will long live in the memory of both parties to the spontaneous exchange.

NOVEMBER MAGAZINES.

SCRIBNER'S.

Mr. Sylvester Baxter tells the story of "The Great November Storm of 1898," in the November Scribner's. One of the most destructive storms ever known on the New England coast it was the occasion for many stirring incidents associated with the irresistible power of the wind and sea. Mr. Baxter gives a vivid impression of the development and climax of the storm, with many details, and of the gradual realization in the public mind of the great loss of life and property involved. The illustrations by H. W. Duzler are from sketches made on the coast during the week following the storm, and convey a spirited and realistic idea of many of the scenes along the shore and at sea. President Hadley of Yale College, one of the best known authorities on the subject in the United States, writes an article of the most timely interest on "The Formation and Control of Trusts." He gives a very clear statement of the motives and conditions that lead to their organization, and points out with re-assuring emphasis some of the causes that are already tending toward their limitation as mere speculative enterprises. He believes that the question of state ownership or control will become less and less acute as a political issue. The concluding instalment of the "Stevenson Letters" deal with his life in Samoa, one of the most romantic and busy periods of his career. He was at work on "The Wrecker," which appeared in the magazine, "David Balfour," and other stories. Many of the letters contain references to his particular literary likes and expressions of opinion upon some of the newer writers who were then beginning to attract attention, among them Kipling, whom he fully appreciated.

THE NATIONAL.

There is a dominant Thanksgiving spirit evident in the text and illustrations of "The National Magazine" for November. The "Story of the Transvaal Struggle," by an American business man, lately returned from South Africa, casts some side lights on the situation. American Supremacy in Iron and Steel is a timely and interesting article.

The Publisher's Department, "Convictions," "Women's Congress of the World," "Second International Congregational Council," and the various special articles and regular departments are bright, timely and full of interest. "Five Keruels of Core," a Thanksgiving poem by Hezekiah Buttrick presents a charming version of an old tradition. It is appropriately illustrated. In the fiction line, this number is a leader. The Thanksgiving stories, sketches and drawings all have their special points of excellence, and the cover and frontispiece, the productions of artists of distinct ability, are unsurpassed by any periodical. Altogether, it would be hard to obtain a larger or better "10 cents' worth of reading matter" than the November number of "The National Magazine."
