## O'Leary Athletic Ass'n Sets Up Sinking Fund

O'Leary — The annual meeting of O'Leary Athletic Association was held in the O'Leary Elementary School Friday evening with a fair attendance of shareholders present.

Therin Ellis brought the meeting to order with the report of the last annual meeting. The financial statement was presented by Douglas Adams and showed an operating profit of \$1,767.17 after deducting operating expenses of \$2,428.84.

Capital expenditures of \$850.20 included landscaping of the grounds, fire protection equipment, also a new stove for the office which left a balance of \$913.81 overall on the year's operation.

It was decided by the shareholders to set aside a portion of the profit as a sinking fund and the amount will be decided at the semi-annual meeting.

Robert Schurman, of CJRW approached the rink management for the location of a broody east coast and this was left for the decision of the directors. A new rink is being scheduled for Charlottetown Dec. 13 and 14 for coaches and referees.

The subject of minor hockey was left in the hands of the O'Leary recreation committee sponsors of the minor hockey program.

Outgoing directors after three years are Orville Willis, Fred Rodgerson, James Smailman, Sterling Boulter, Lawrence Harris and new directors are Douglas Adams, Lester Stilliker, Wynburn Harris, Foster Smailman and Alton Rayner.

RE-ELECTED OFFICERS — President Therin Ellis was re-elected, also vice-president, James Bagdole and secretary-treasurer, Alton Rayner.

Ralph Bishop was re-appointed auditor and the caustic occasion was awarded to C. F. Willis and Son. The rink operator is Donald Ellis.

A committee was appointed to investigate the cost of a cement floor in the rink which would permit year-round recreation activities. And another committee was appointed to work with the regional high school in setting up rules and regulations regarding the school and rink grounds which are adjoining.

It was reported that ice-making is proceeding well and several more frosty nights will see the ice in readiness for the season.

## Mobile Feed Mill Offering Custom Service In W. Prince

Alberton — Douglas Rix and Wendell Weeks, two Alberton men, have returned home from a business trip to Lancaster, Pennsylvania, bringing with them a mobile feed processing plant. This is the first machine of its kind to be brought to the western part of the province.

For the farmer who grows his own grain this feedmobile should prove to be a great convenience since it will save him the time and labor involved in bagging his grains and conveying it to and from a mill. Instead of going to the mill the farmer may now have the mill come to him.

Powered by its own diesel engine, the mobile mill will grind grains and roughage, mix the ground material with vitamin and mineral feed fortifiers, and blend in molasses all according to the farmer's own specifications. In other words it will provide a complete on-farm feed processing service.

The labor saving air lifting device will carry grain from the bin into the machine and return the processed feed to the bin.

It is expected that a regular route and schedule will be established.

Mr. Rix, the son of a miller, operates a service station in Alberton. Mr. Weeks, who will operate the feedmobile has had experience farming and also in the operation of heavy machinery.

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says by late Monday evening the rain had ended in the Annapolis Valley of Nova Scotia and in the southwestern portion of that province as well as extreme southwestern New Brunswick. Over the remainder of the Maritimes rain and strong winds were occurring.

As a low pressure area centered near Quebec City late Monday evening continues to move northward and drift slightly to the east, the rain will end in all regions by late this afternoon. Temperatures in the mid 90s and cloudy skies are forecast for all three provinces today.

## Three-Year Prison Sentence Given For Indecent Assault

SUMMERSIDE — Found guilty earlier on the charge of indecent assault on a two-year-old Sherbrooke child, Ross Hogwood Rayner, Clermont, was sentenced to three years in Dorchester Penitentiary by Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell at a sitting of the Supreme Court in Summerside yesterday.

In passing down sentence, the chief justice told the accused that the offence draws a maximum penalty of 14 years, but that in view of his previous good record, and with the indication this was an isolated case, he would not give the maximum penalty.

He also recommended that psychiatric advice be available for the accused.

Harold Goodwin was defence counsel, and George R. McMahon appeared for the crown.

TWO YEAR TERM — Leonard Philip Thibeau, Kensington, charged with possession of stolen goods, valued at less than \$50, radio stolen from the Kensington Co-op with a cost price of \$39.50, was sentenced to two years in penitentiary.

Chief Justice Campbell told the accused that the jury had given him the benefit of the doubt in finding him guilty of a lesser charge. Thibeau had originally been charged with possession of stolen goods, valued at more than \$50, the retail value of the radio.

In assessing the maximum penalty for the crime the chief justice said "in view of a previous record I am convinced that a jail sentence would be ineffective."

Thibeau's record showed that he had previously served a two-year term in the penitentiary and that on two occasions he had escaped from Prince County Jail while serving time.
