

The Farm.

A writer in a well-known agricultural paper recommends the feeding of peas to hogs; says they are superior to corn, because they supply all the wants of the system, and make a firmer, more healthful flesh.

Time to cut Barley.—It is a great mistake to leave barley until dead ripe before cutting. If the stems are green not only will the barley be plumper but less liable to injury from rains.

If seeds are to be kept over a year they should be kept in a cool location and exposed to the light and air. Keeping them in the darkness weakens vitality, perhaps from a tendency to grow which darkness incites, but unaccompanied by moisture enough to put forth leaf and root.

Time to cut Timothy.—The objection to timothy is that it is often very dirty, is generally caused by the pollen of the flower, which makes a fine powder when dried. The grass should be cut either before or after this stage to avoid this, preferably before, as after the timothy goes out of blossom the stalk becomes woody and unpalatable.

Liquid Manures.—If a barrel is filled with rain water, and some finely decomposed hen manure put into it from time to time, the mixture will have a very stimulating effect on hills of cucumbers, squashes, watermelons and cabbages to which it may be applied.

Hilling Potatoes Early.—While some earth should be drawn around potato plants to prevent the tubers from being sunburned, this work should not be done too early. It is the last job done to the crop before harvesting, and if completed very early the soil fills with weeds to the injury of the crop.

Rye in Buckwheat.—Although buckwheat shades the ground more than any other crop, yet rye sown with it will live through until the buckwheat is harvested and make a good growth for fall feed. If not sown pretty closely in the fall the rye will attempt to head the same fall and will be entirely killed by the winter.

Flies and Plants.—Has any one observed that rooms which geraniums and calceolarias grow are free from flies? The Boston Herald of July 31 has the following from the correspondent: For three years I have lived in a town, and during that time my sitting room has been free from flies, three only walking about my breakfast table, while all my neighbors' rooms are crowded.

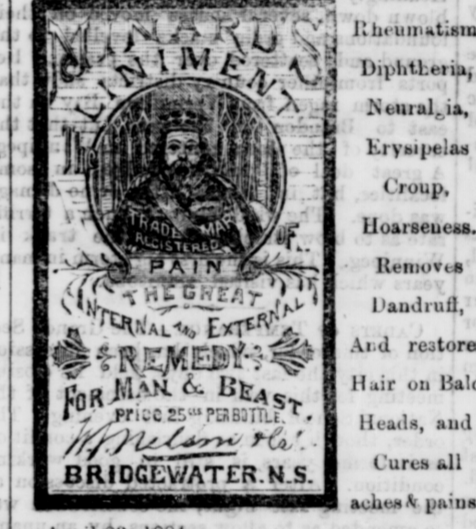
