Fire Destroys Dance Hall

The blaze was discovered early Thursday morning by Messrs. Wallace MacIntosh and James Campbell and was then too far advanced to do anything towards saving the structure, or the contents of the canteen which was run in connection with the dance hall. The building was one purchased by Mr. Noye from the Mt. Pleasant airport and although the owner could not be reached last evening to ascertain the cause of the fire or the estimated damage, it is believed that the loss would be about one thousand dollars. Local residents could offer no cause for the origin of the fire. -S

Final Meeting Of Season Of S'side Board

At the final meeting, before summer recess of the Summerside Board of Trade held last evening in the Town Hall, various matters of interest to the community were given consideration by the members. The meeting was presided over by Mr. R. S. Hinton, K.C., the president and was more than usually well attended. The matter of better approaches to the Town and better control at the C.N.R. crossing both east and west and on King Street were discussed and Mr. Fred Bell of the transportation committee was empowered to write to the C.N.R. authorities earnestly requesting that suitable warnings be placed at these points and that a copy of the text be forwarded to the Summerside Town Council with a recommendation that the Council submit a similar request. For the fisheries committee Mr. George Key reported that the matter of protection for the smelts during the spawning season had been referred to Mr. L. J. Murphy, fisheries inspector and that Mr. Murphy had written to the effect that nine wardens had been appointed and that the regulations in this regard would in the future be more efficiently enforced. The department, the letter stated, had employed a number of fisheries wardens, beginning work the middle of April and continued until late fall. Discuss Road - Mr. Fred Bell, chairman of the transportation committee said that there were indications that the Kensington-Borden highway was shortly to be repaired and that it would appear from the position of the stakes in the ground along the road that the highway was to be only sixty feet wide. It was the opinion of the members present that immediate action be taken to ascertain if this was so, as an eighty-foot highway was the width to be expected. It was moved by Mr. T. E. Hickey that Mr. Bell contact the Minister of Public Works, get all available information and if necessary have the secretary call a special meeting of the board to deal with the matter. Mr. Donald Baker was unanimously appointed as chairman of the marine committee replacing Mr. John E. Campbell, whose death occurred since the last meeting. Mr. J. F. Arnett paid high tribute to the late Mr. Campbell and the long service he had given to the board during his lifetime. It was moved that a letter of condolence be sent to the family of the late Mr. Campbell and also to the family of the late Mr. R. T. Holman, also one of the very active and prominent members of the board down through the years. Congratulations Extended - Mr. Reagh Tinney called the attention of the board to the fact that Mr. C. R. Rogers, the only living charter member of the Summerside Board of Trade had this week reached his 84th birthday and it was agreed that the board forward to Mr. Rogers best wishes for good health and the compliments of the members. Considerable discussion took place regarding the proposal to use the funds held in trust by the board to furnish a room in the new hospital. In view of the fact that this fund was originally set up to be used as advertising for the fox industry, it was suggested by Mr. J. F. Arnett that no action be taken at present on the proposal and that the matter be left in abeyance until the board resumed its fall meetings. Mr. Alan Holman stated that a suggestion, with which he was heartily in accord, had been made to him by Mr. William Smallman, president of Smallmans Ltd., regarding the matter of holidays and closing hours in Summerside. Mr. Holman pointed out that it is a question that is left to the three large retail stores in Summerside to decide and the suggestion made was that a special committee of the board be formed whose duties would be to work in cooperation with the Town Council in suggesting what days would be observed also with the matter of closing hours. This committee, he said, should be made up of representatives of every class of business, the industries, the small stores and the retail stores so that all would have a voice in formulating the policy to be followed in this matter. Messrs. Kaye Hansen and A.G. Rogers were proposed as members of the Board and accepted. -S

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IN MEMORIAM

HENRY WARD BEECHER WILLIAMS

On Thursday, March 9th, 1950, Henry Ward Beecher Williams entered into rest at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Ronald Hutchinsion, Summerside. Although at an advanced age and in failing health for several years, he retained his faculties and was able to be up and about his room until the time of his death. Mr. Williams was born at Bideford April 17th, 1888, the eldest son of the late Albert Richard and Mary Amelia Williams. He was a brilliant mathematician and scholar, an excellent penman. In his early life he was Accountant with the late Hon. William Richards of Bideford, P. E. I. during the days of ship building at that place. In 1910 he accepted the position of registrar in the Court House at Summerside, which position he held until 1915 when he moved to Port Hill as accountant and private secretary to the late Hon. Senator John Yeo. Besides serving in this capacity, Mr. Williams did a great deal of legal work for people in the surrounding districts and will be greatly missed for his sound judgment and advice. He is survived by his widow and five daughters - Mrs. Keith Matheson and Helen of O'Leary, Mrs. Ronald Hutchinsion, Daisy and Kathleen of Summerside and one sister Daisy, Mrs. M. J. MacLeod of Edmonton, Alta. who visited him last September. He was predeceased by two children who died in infancy and four brothers, Arthur, Bayfield, Clifford and Claude and one sister, Reby. The funeral was held from the Bonness Funeral Home to St. James Anglican Church, Port Hill, where a short service was held, Rev. L. A. Dignan officiating. Interment was in the Church Cemetery. The many beautiful flowers bore silent tribute of love and respect for the departed and sympathy to the bereaved. The pall bearers were Joseph

Veale, Sydney Birch, Archibald Ellis, Henry Yeo, William J. Dennis and Stuart Montgomery. -S
