A Good Showing.

The official statement of the revenue and expenditure of the Dominion for the month of May and for the eleven months of the current fiscal year, recently issued, shows that the increase of revenue as compared with last year still continues. The consolidated fund receipts for the month of May, 1889, as compared with the same month last year, show an increase of \$144,308, as follows:—

Captain Welsh's Release.

We feel sure the majority of our readers will be pleased to learn that His Excellency the Governor General has commuted the remaining term of Captain Welsh's period of imprisonment, and that he will be discharged at the expiry of his two years in the Penitentiary.

Captain Welsh was, of course, in the eye of the law, guilty of the crime for which he was convicted, and the Judge who presided at the trial, and the jury, only discharged their duty when they found the prisoner guilty.

Commercial Arrangements.

THE United States Senate Committee on closer business relations with Canada, is now in session at St. Paul, Minn. Senator Hoar, who is the chairman of the Committee, expressed himself as follows, about their work: "We have visited San Francisco and all California points. From there we went up to Portland, Seattle, Tacoma, and other points, investigating as we went. At every place we held a meeting and took the testimony that was freely volunteered to the commercial relations with Canada. Of course we have nothing to do with any projects for closer relations, politically speaking, but we are anxious to find out the sentiment of the country on closer business relations. When the fisheries treaty was thrown out by the Senate it left the question of our relations with Canada in a queer position. Legislation must be enacted next session on the subject. For the purpose of obtaining information that will serve as a guide in framing such legislation, we are taking this trip. Everywhere along the route we have been met with an expressed desire for closer relations. The International railway systems are becoming so complicated that some arrangement is necessary to prevent any clashing of interests between the two countries."

Notes and Comments.

—An exchange says: "A Texas town has a paper entitled the 'Communit Liar.'" Evidently some Grit editor has emigrated West.

—The petition for the repeal of the Canada Temperance Act will be voted upon in the County of Elgin, Ont., on the 3rd of July. The Act was put in force there on the 26th May, 1885. An order-in-council has been passed revoking the Scott Act in Leeds and Grenville.

—The Detroit Free Press is at times amusing! In a late issue it says it wants to see the right of the United States "to catch fish anywhere on earth" fully established. We have always been of the opinion that it was the right to catch fish in water the Americans were after. But, of course, the Free Press knows better.

—A Montreal despatch says that the Rev. Mr. Campbell, who was sent into the eastern townships to work up the anti-Jesuit agitation, has met with very poor success. His meeting at Waterloo was composed of 20 persons, mostly ladies; at Sherbrooke it was very little better, and at Cowansville the meeting was postponed. In short, the agitation has turned out to be a large fiasco, the Protestants of the townships persisting in their support of Sir John Macdonald and Hon. Mr. Taitton.

—Late news from the Samoan Islands is to the effect that the natives, though apprehensive of the future, show no ill feeling toward any of the foreign powers. They assisted German sailors in getting the Olga afloat, and their divers have been helping Germans and Americans to recover treasure, guns, papers and other material from the wrecks of their vessels. They have been compelled to desist, however, on account of the descent into the water perilous even for the islanders.

Rev. W. A. Crawford-Frost.

A NUMBER of Rev. W. A. Crawford-Frost's friends, on Tuesday afternoon, prior to his leaving the Island for ordination, presented him with an address. The Hon. James Warburton, before reading it said: "Before reading you the address which we are assembled to present to you, permit me to offer my hearty congratulations on your being elected Rector of St. George's Church, New Glasgow, Nova Scotia, with many wishes that your ministry begun here may be long and successful, and be the means of bringing many souls to Christ."

Below will be found the address and reply thereto:— The Rev. W. A. Crawford-Frost: REV. AND DEAR SIR,—We, the undersigned, members of St. Paul's Church, have learned with deep regret your intention of resigning, at an early date, your position in our church.

It is a cause of much anxiety to us that this conclusion has been brought about by a difference of opinion between you and yourself on certain doctrinal points, which are now disturbing the Anglican Church in many parts of the world, and that your difference is of such a radical nature, that you, as an Evangelical Churchman, cannot concur with views, to which you in conscience are opposed.

Besides being a faithful exponent of the doctrines of our Evangelical Church during your short term of office amongst us, we have not failed to recognize in your pulpit duties and other ministrations among our people, young and old, rich and poor, sick and afflicted, a kind friend and faithful pastor.

May the Great Head of the Church greatly bless your labor wherever you may be called to work in His vineyard, and our prayer is that you may daily increase in His Holy Spirit more and more, until you come to His everlasting kingdom.

We ask your acceptance of the accompanying purse as a small token of our affection and of our appreciation of your services as Curate of St. Paul's.

REPLY.

MY DEAR FRIENDS:—The regret which you have so kindly expressed at my departure is, I assure you, deeply shared by myself. It only required this last token of your love for me to deepen my regret into positive pain that I am obliged by my conscience to leave you. You express anxiety for the future of the congregation because of the divergence arising from your rector's change of views. The difference between us is a difference of opinion, a very important difference in my estimation in regard to certain points of Church doctrine, but nevertheless solely a difference of opinion; and it is one of the most satisfactory characteristics of our beloved Anglican Church that she is broad enough to contain these varieties of opinion. "High" Churchmen and "Evangelical" Churchmen are not opposing forces. They are allies fighting a common enemy, Satan. The difference is that they fight with different weapons. I believe the High Church sword to be dull, yet let us all be loyal to our conscience, to each other, to the Anglican Church, and to Christ, and we need have no anxiety as to our future as individuals or as Churchmen. But, though allies, each must be allowed to fight in his own way. We can fight in the same army, but not in the same regiment, in the same Church, but not in the same congregation. The divergence, as you know, arose from the Rector's change of views as expressed by him to you at your annual meeting. As fellow graduates of Wycliffe College, we were agreed when I came here. He tells you he has changed, I have not, hence we differ. But the difficulty, it is hardly necessary for me to say, is not in any sense a personal one, it is entirely a question of doctrine, and the pain I feel at being obliged to leave my friends in the congregation, is heightened by my sorrow that I am obliged at the same time to forgo the helpful guidance of a kind superior, as well as his brotherly companionship.

Permit me to thank you earnestly for your many acts of kindness to me during the past year, and especially for this substantial evidence of the high esteem and affection with which you honor me. When any of you visit Nova Scotia I hope you will not fail to come to St. George's, New Glasgow, where I can assure you a hearty welcome from the Rector and his people. May God bless and prosper you, and I hope that the happy intercourse between us, begun in our parish of the Church, militant, may be renewed in the Holy Church, triumphant, where we will learn our Church Doctrine direct from its fountain head, from the very lips of our blessed Saviour himself.

—The production of winter wheat in the state of Kansas is estimated at 33,780,000 bushels, an excess of 17,644,000 bushels over last year. The area of corn is estimated at 7,260,628 acres, and all crops are in excellent condition.

—Quebec advices say there seems now no doubt that Premier Mercier has decided to call an early fall session, pass his gerrymander bill, creating eight more seats, and appeal to the people. L'Electeur has opened the campaign with an eight-column article, making a frantic appeal to the electorate. The Conservatives throughout the Province are united and ready for the fray.

—In the course of the recent debate on the French Budget, M. Rouvier, Minister of Finance, adduced facts to show that France was by no means on the verge of ruin. Public wealth and prosperity, he said, had grown as well as the budget. Deposits at the banks amounted to 910,000,000 francs, and the capital embarked in shares and other industrial undertakings showed since 1876 an increase of 7,000,000,000. The deposits in the savings bank amounted to 2,228,000, belonging to 6,492,000 depositors. That was a sufficient answer to the gloomy picture that had been drawn of the situation.
