THE FIGHTING IN SAMOA

Engagement Between Rebels and Friendlies.

A GERMAN FLAG CAPTURED BY LIEUTENANT GAUNT

The Victorious Party Cheered by English and Americans.

AUCKLAND, April 28.—Particulars of the fighting in Samoa contained in advices received here from Apia under the date of April 18, show that a battle between the friendly natives and rebels took place at Vailolo, and that the latter lost 100 men killed and wounded.

During the engagement Lieut Gaunt succeeded in capturing a German flag which was flying over a fort.

On the return of the landing party Capt Stuart of the Tauranga signalled "well done Gaunt's Brigade."

The Americans and British cheered the returning party, whose sutlers were proudly carrying the captured German colours.

CAPT. COGHLAN'S SPEECH

He Just Escapes Being Retired.

The Filipinos Looking for Peace.

MANILA, April 28, 4 25 a. m.—The Filipinos will seek for peace. Colonel Argueta, and Lieut. Jose Bernal, Chief of General Luna's Staff, have entered General MacArthur's line bearing a flag of truce. They are en route to Manila, by train, to confer with General Otis regarding the terms of surrender.

The Antarctic Continent.

CHRISTIANIA, April 26.—A letter has been received here from Captain Borchgrevink, a commander of the expedition making an exploration of the Antarctic continent, dated from Cape Adair, Victoria Island, February 23, in which he says: "I have now landed on the great Antarctic continent with my staff, instruments and 75 dogs. The greatest discipline has prevailed throughout."

DISCUSSING THE CIVIL SERVICE

Monck's Reasonable and Just Bill

DEFEATED IN THE HOUSE BY SIR WILFRID LAURIER.

The McCarthyites and Patron Vote Against the Government.

OTTAWA, April 28.—Bostock's bill, providing for the compulsory issue of railway passes by companies to members of parliament was lost on division.

Monck (Cons.) moved the second reading of the bill providing that where the Government dismissed civil servants, the person dismissed be entitled to a certificate setting forth the length and character of his services, the reasons for dismissal, the name of the person who made the complaint against him and the record of the investigation, if one had been held.

In the course of the speech Monck made arraignment of the spoils system.

After further discussion, Sir Wilfrid Laurier laid down the principle that the relation of civil servants towards the government was that of an ordinary employee to his master. He moved that the bill be given to six months hoist.

Sir Charles Tupper in a strong speech, pointed out that the present Government had degraded the public service by driving out some of the best men and terrorizing others.

The Premier had now made plain how he and his colleagues had come to do the country this great wrong.

They started out with the assumption that they were masters and that the officers were their personal servants.

They forgot that both ministers and officials were the servants of the people. Having introduced the spoils system into this country, with all the degradation that it involved, the Government was now refusing to the victims of its tyranny the opportunity to secure situations after they were turned out of the public employ.

They not only deprived the civil servants of their living but also of their good name.

Sir Charles declared that Monck's bill was eminently reasonable and just.

Discussion of the spoils system was resumed in the evening. A vote was finally taken on Laurier's amendment which was carried by a vote of 64 to 39.

Stubbs and Leighton McCarthy, the only two McCarthy members, and Roger the only Patron member, voted against the Government.

Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper has returned from British Columbia. He took his seat yesterday.

A NEGRO BISHOP

Frees His Mind About the Georgian Atrocities.

NEW YORK, April 26.—The New Jersey annual conference of the African Methodist Episcopal church was opened in Jersey City to-day. Bishop Alexander Walters, D. D., presiding.

Bishop Walters in his address bitterly denounced the Georgian lynchings. He said: "The civilized world has been shocked by the unpremeditated lynchery and burning of Samuel Hose. The fiendishness of the crime beggars description. It is generally believed by the fair-minded that if Hose did not kill Cranford it was to avenge the killing of five colored men by a bomb said to have been fired by Crawford at Palmetto, March 18 h. "The real cause of our trouble is race hatred. In all cases it is not because we are black, for some negroes who are hated have blonde hair and blue eyes, and they are so fair that they can hardly be distinguished from the pure whites, yet this class of negro is a sufferer in common with the blackest; all that is needed for them to be discriminated against is for it to be known that they have a drop of negro blood in their veins. I have come to the conclusion that nothing but manly resistance on the part of Afro-Americans themselves will stop these atrocities. President McKinley and the federal government have shown themselves impotent to convict the murderers of federal officials. The governors of certain states in the south have acknowledged their inability to protect their colored citizens. In the name of Almighty God, what are we to do but fight and die?"

Henry only an Accomplice.

PARIS, April 24.—The Figaro continues its publication of the testimony of the Court of Cassation in the Dreyfus revision enquiry. Capt. Culnet, who described the discovery of the forgery of Lieut.-Col. Henry, told the court that, in his opinion, Henry was only an accomplice of Col. Du Paty de Clam, the principal author of the forgery, inasmuch as Henry was never before accused of wrong-doing, while Du Paty de Clam was known to be guilty of shady practices.

Wireless Telegraphy.

LONDON, April 26.—Signor Marconi, the electrician, whose experiments in wireless telegraphy are attracting international attention, has successfully communicated from South Foreland, Kent, England, to the French armed despatch vessel Ibis, while sailing in the English channel. In conducting the experiment he was accompanied by a French naval officer. The fact remarks also his first success in concentrating messages at one point to the exclusion of all others.

A LIBERAL BLUFF.

Trying to Scare off Exposure of the Brockville Scandal.

BROCKVILLE, Ont., April 26.—The two arrests made on Saturday for the alleged use of fraudulent ballots has caused a great consternation in the Liberal ranks. Empey, the second man returned to in Saturday's despatch has been released on \$1,200 bail to appear on Thursday. The Liberals are trying a great bluffing game of retaliation that may cause a great many arrests and intimate that unless the charges are dropped every Tory office holder under the Government will be dismissed. These threats will not deter the Conservative party from rooting out corruption. From all points of the riding fresh tales are coming in of strangers who off red fraudulent ballots.

Mr. Comstock was declared elected by a majority of 243. The figures were: Comstock, 1,870; Peter White, 1,627. There were only sixty-nine rejected ballots.

A German's Opinion.

MONTREAL, April 26.—Mr. Boff, the Imperial German Consul for Canada, in an interview on the alleged utterances of Captain Coghlin, of the United States steamship Raleigh, spoke very strongly. "I am satisfied that there is no truth in the story, and that the communication from New York is a new attempt to create a bad feeling between Germany and the United States, and to disturb the friendly relations which so far has withstood all calumnies. What J. C. Coghlin is said to have uttered sounds like the bragging of a man who drank too much at the banquet. I do not know whether there is a captain by the name of Coghlin in the United States navy, but if such is the case, I hope, or I may say feel sure, for the sake of the United States navy, that he could not fight himself. On the other hand I also hope, for the sake of the United States navy, that there is no admiral or officer belonging to it who could talk about a foreign flag in the manner that Admiral Dewey is said to have done about the German flag. The flag and the honor of an officer are identical, and we say in Germany, a man who has no respect for the honor of others has no honor himself. The above are only suppositions of mine based on the esteem I have for the United States navy. I may add that there is no officer in the German navy who would listen to an insult to his flag without taking from the offender the possibility of repeating it, so that if Admiral Dewey is alive still the whole story is a lie."
