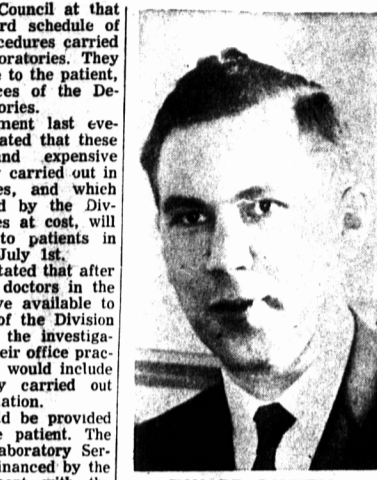
Greeks Protest British Search; Arms Are Found

DISCUSS SOVIET CHANGE

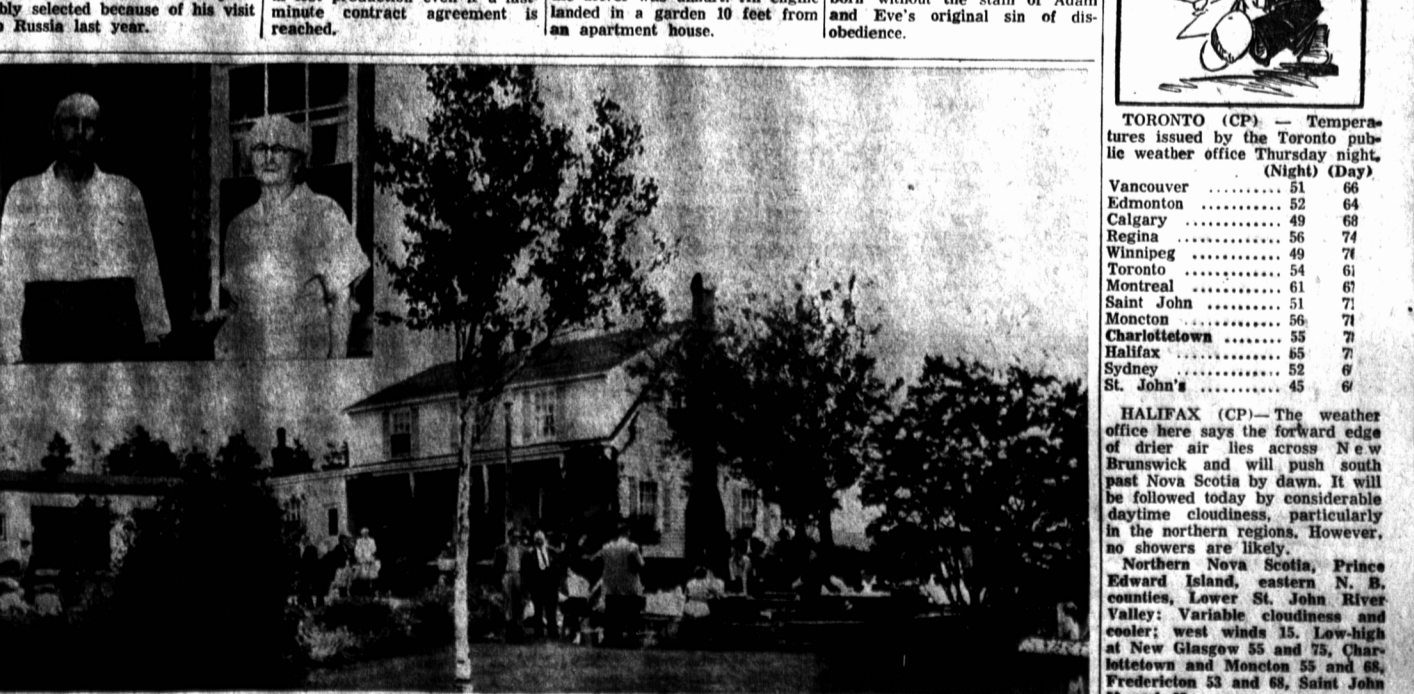
