## HUNTERS' CORNER

### Remembers First Column

The completely modern new Guardian Headquarters has many advantages over the old setup. It is bright, roomy and contains facilities in the field of present day newspaper work second to none in eastern Canada. Past records are at one's finger tips and thus, with a little coaching from Vere Beck, I was able to check back and ascertain the day and date my first column appeared in print. It was on Monday, December 11, 1944. It will soon have its twelfth anniversary.

I remember as distinctly as if it were yesterday the day I walked into the late J. R. Burnett's office and inquired if he was interested in an original outdoor weekly column. He quietly read the sample column I had written and then looked up. He was a very direct man and never believed in wasting words when a sentence would suffice. "Yes," he replied, "I am interested. We'll try it for a few months to see how it takes." The few months has stretched out into the years and I now find myself with somewhat of a chore on my hands.

I never have been able to satisfy myself as to what motive prompted me to write Hunter's Corner. Maybe the bustling December days when the old familiar marshes and lakes were sealed under ice and snow and the tinkling brooks and placid trout pools were stilled by the inclement hand of winter brought out an urge to relieve pleasurable past experiences with rod and gun. That could have been chief reason but at that I am not too sure. There were times when I seriously considered letting my column drop but quite a few old time hunters who had reached the end of their line in respect to hunting activities prevailed upon me to keep it up. As one Old Timer remarked: "I relive my hunting days when I read your stories... it's all I have left now."

It is also a medium through which wildlife information such as seasons, plenitude of game, etc., is transmitted to the hunting and angling fraternity.

This spring may be late in respect to cropping activities but the hatch of crows is right on schedule... ahead of schedule in fact.

# Swim Craze Starts Again

There have already been eight attempts on the 22-mile crossing of Juan de Fuca this year. All ended in failure. Many other swimmers are in training. The Bell of Toronto, the only swimmer to conquer Lake Ontario and the youngest to swim the English Channel.

Meanwhile, interest continues to grow in planned Lake Ontario crossings. The chamber of commerce at Niagara-on-the-Lake will endorse an organized swim this year. It plans to award trophies, and other organizations have indicated they will put up prize money.

Flo Chadwick, 36-year-old marathoner from San Diego, Calif., has said she will attempt a crossing this summer. She is to start from Youngstown, N.Y., the same point where Marilyn entered the water in 1954. The target is the Toronto waterfront, about 32 miles away.

Others are getting in shape for cracks at Lake Ontario, a treacherous 32-mile expanse that smashed the hopes of more than 25 swimmers in 1955. One marathoner, Clifford Snowdon of Toronto, was drowned in Victoria, a 270-pound chef made his fifth attempt to swim across the Strait of Juan de Fuca last Monday. He was hauled out.

Bert Thomas of Tacoma, Wash. is the only person to swim the strait. He crossed from Port Angeles, Wash. to Victoria last year. Thomas has challenged Cliff Lumsdon of Toronto, winner of the Canadian National Exhibition's 32-mile waterfront marathon last fall, to a duel across the strait.

Then there's Gerda Olsson, 19-year-old brunette from Edinburgh, She tried it last year and was taken from the water after covering 20 miles. Brenda Fisher, 27, who polly suggests she is the world's best long-distance swimmer, failed last year and will try again in 1956.

Winnie Roach Leuzler will also try it again. Mrs. Leuzler, 30-year-old native of Toronto who in 1951 became the first Canadian to swim the Channel, failed on her lake bid in 1955.

Bobby Jones won his third United States open golf championship in the most lopsided title play-off all time 27 years ago today. Posting identical scores of 294, Jones and Abe Espinosa went another 36 holes, with the great Bobby grabbing the honors by 23 strokes, 141 to 164.

As he crumpled in a burst of black feathers and thudding on the ground I felt a twinge of remorse but when I picked him up and looked at his rough, scaly legs and beak as flinty as a pick axe, I was glad I had won.
