Progress of the War.

The English Mail arrived at 11 o'clock last night, but the couriers were unable to bring the Bags of Couriers...

The Royal Mail Steamship Casca arrived at Halifax on Monday the 17th inst., between one and two o'clock, after a fine passage of only eleven days.

A following summary comprehends all that is known of affairs in the Crimea:—The nation is awaiting with feverish impatience the arrival of some fresh reinforcements...

A general Cannobert, writing on the 25th inst., announces to his Government that the allied forces were about to resume offensive. He states that they are full of confidence, and make good their losses...

Nothing can show more clearly the impatience which the English feel with respect to the operations of the allies, which command his front and rear, as well as the harbor, than these desperate efforts to possess himself of the heights...

A HUNDRED THOUSAND RUSSIANS MARCHING ON TO THE CRIMEA. Letters from Galatz state that on the 25th, General Pawloff II, occupied Reni, on the Pruth, with two battalions of Chasakoff's regiments...

DEPARTURE FROM MENSCHIKOFF.—Nothing remarkable had taken place at Sebastopol between the 20th and 26th December, with the exception of two sorties on the 21st. In one of these sorties, 11 officers and 33 privates were killed...

PREPARATIONS FOR BATTLE.—On the 25th, the English and French troops were making preparations for a battle. Omar Pacha was expected soon. Considerable reinforcements of the line arrived at Odessa on the 25th.

ARRIVAL OF FURTHER REINFORCEMENTS AT THE BARRIERS OF THE CRIMEA.—On the 25th, 1,170 had also arrived at Kamiesh on the 26th. Every night the Russians attempted sorties, but were repulsed.

ST. PETERSBURG, JAN. 3.—His Imperial Majesty, penetrated by the duties imposed upon all Christians, declares, "We will reject no offer of assistance which will promote the welfare of the Empire and the happiness of our subjects."

RUSSIAN REINFORCEMENTS.—A letter from Odessa says that the 9th division of the Crimea, under the command of General Popoff, has this day received orders to proceed by forced marches to the Crimea.

"CONVANTINOPLE, Dec. 21.—On the 10th the Russian and British positions with great propriety be made, and that there was some chance, indeed, of a Russian success in anticipation of ours, but from Russia...

"ONCESS, Dec. 25.—A courier has just brought intelligence that General Liprandi's corps, powerfully reinforced, is attacking Balakava.

"RUSSIAN DESPATCHES FROM THE CRIMEA of the 25th, show that nothing important had occurred since the 24th of December.

"MARBELLA, Jan. 2.—The Gauges, which left Constantinople on the 25th of December, has arrived at Toulon. Despatches from the Government left Marseilles at the same time.

"THE KING OF PRUSSIA SHOWS HIS WORRY. Colonel Manteuffel, on his return from Vienna, has had long audience of the King, to render an account of his mission.
