FLOODS IN JAVA

JAKARTA, Indonesia, Jan. 24 (Reuters)—Seven months rain-fall in three days have brought Java's worst floods for 20 years killed 41 people and swamped plantations. At Pati, Central Java, reservoirs overflowed and drowned 37 people. At nearby Semarang an old woman and three children died when their home was flooded while they slept.

Nicholson and A. D. MacLure were taken up on the committee. In discussion with the committee later in the afternoon it was learned that, in their opinion, the site previously proposed on the north side was the one which met in the greatest extent the requirements of the department.

The site, at the almost exact centre of the town, adjacent south of Jamieson's Pharmacy, includes properties owned by MacGowan's Ltd., Kilmuir, and B. N. Hooley, Montague. This would give a frontage of approximately 85 feet, and with the possible purchase of the Higginbotham property would extend the frontage to 125 feet.

It is also possible that the land to the rear of these properties, owned by Mr. Henry MacLaren, Montague and Charlottetown, may also be purchased to provide a rear entrance for rural mail couriers. Thus the new post office would be surrounded by four streets with easy access from two.

Mr. Kichham was hopeful that the building would get under way this year after preliminary had been completed, but the final decision would have to come from the Postal Department, he said. However, he pointed out, that now that the way was clear, matters could be accomplished with greater rapidity, and Montague would likely have its new post office as soon as possible.

IN MEMORIAM

FRANCIS MCCARTHY

The residents of Morell and vicinity were greatly shocked and saddened by the sudden passing of Francis McCarthy on Thursday, January 10th.

Frank, as he was familiarly known, left home on Thursday morning on a business trip to Charlottetown. Before his business was transacted, the angel of death had claimed him. To his loving wife, awaiting his return, was brought the sorrowful news of his sudden death.

He was in his sixty-seventh year and though ailing for some time no one dreamed the end was so near. Of a quiet and genial disposition, Frank was a general favorite with both young and old.

He was a life-long resident of Morell where he was a prosperous farmer, and was always ready to lend a hand to a friend or neighbor. He will be sorely missed by his associates.

For thirty years he was a valued and faithful member of the church choir where he served in the capacity of both organist and leader. To all the parish endeavours he gave his whole-hearted support. An exemplary Catholic he was the model of a true Christian. The words of Scripture which describe St. Joseph may surely be applied to him, for truly, "He was a just man."

Nor does the comparison end there. His home was patterned on that of Nazareth, where peace, union and charity reigned supreme. One of the greatest dreams of his life was realized last June when his adopted son, the Reverend Reginald Phelan, was ordained a priest of God.

He is survived by his wife, the former Mamie McCarthy, his adopted son, Reverend Reginald Phelan, Tracadie; a brother Louis, Sydney, N. S.; a sister Annie (Mrs. Chudleigh) Calgary; three brothers and two sisters predeceased him.

His funeral, which was largely attended, took place on Monday, January 14th, from the Church of the Little Flower. Solemn High Mass of Requiem was sung by Reverend Reginald Phelan assisted by Reverend Phelan, McKenna, Deacon and Reverend Francis Aylmer, Tracadie. Reverend William Simpson was Master of Ceremonies and Reverend Owen Sharkey, Thurifer.

The burial took place in the adjoining cemetery. Reverend Phelan McKenna conducted the services at the grave.
