I will give a little background in the hope that you can spot a clue to the reason for his gambling. He has an IQ of 125, superb athletic ability, is good looking and has average success in getting along with people.

His father and I are happily married. We have a church work, a circle of close friends, many pleasant acquaintances, and no financial problems. We enjoy working with teen-agers and all phases of an active role in sponsoring programs and organizations in which we were interested.

Any suggestion or help we can be given will be appreciated. We have already tried the obvious things such as pastoral counselling, R.Y.

Dear R.Y.: About seven years ago an organization known as Gamblers Anonymous (GA) came into being. It is strikingly similar in spirit and aim to the 25 year old Alcoholics Anonymous, (AA) and was, I believe, frankly patterned on AA.

GA's aspiration is to help the gambler, with his consent and cooperating, what AA does for the problem drinker, namely, show him how to break the grip of compulsive habit and become rational with the help of God.
