POLICE COURT.—This forenoon William E. Barrow, Isaac Murley and James Langman were each fined \$50 and costs or two months imprisonment for first fractions of the Canada Temperance Act. The cases against John Hughes, Jr., and Patrick McAleer, were adjourned, the former for one week and the latter until Monday next.

ICE FORMING.—The cold snap of yesterday and today is causing ice to form about the wharves and in our harbors and bays. This morning the Jacques Cartier could not get nearer Halliday's wharf than a quarter of a mile, and the passengers had to be landed on the ice. A corpse on board had to be landed at the same place on a sledge. The Southport did not go to West River today for fear of the ice. The Northumberland left Summerside at the usual time this morning, and is expected back tonight.

A SAD CASE.—A middle-aged man named Michael D. Conroy, was brought to the city to-day from Mount Stewart and placed in the Hospital for the insane. DeConroy's case is a very sad one. His wife and three of his children died some time ago, and two of his children are very ill of consumption at the present time. DeConroy has been acting very queerly for about a month past, and on Monday he became violent. He got possession of an axe with which it was feared he would do some harm, and it required the united efforts of several men to take the weapon from him.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—The aged widow of Agnes McLean, who lived with her little granddaughter in a small house at Melville, was burned to death a few days ago. It seems that the little girl went for some water, and upon her return discovered smoke issuing from the door of the house. She alarmed the neighbors, and the fire was extinguished. But the poor old woman had perished in the flames, most of her clothing having been burned to cinders. It is supposed that in the absence of the little girl, Mrs. McLean, who was blind, went too near the stove and her clothing took fire.
