**THE ST. JOHN EXHIBITION.**  
Senator Ferguson a Successful Exhibitor.  
(St. John Sun.)

Senator Ferguson, of Prince Edward Island, has every reason to be proud of the success that his exhibit of sheep and cattle has achieved. With 32 entries in this exhibition, he carried off 31 prizes and a diploma. "Inloch Farm" has thus sustained the reputation it won at the recent exhibition at Charlottetown. The Senator, who is an experienced breeder, goes in for Galloway cattle as the breed best adapted all round to the needs of the greater part of the Maritime Provinces.

The Galloways are the oldest distinct breed of cattle in the United Kingdom, and were originally found in the highlands of the last forty years the Scotch breeders have bred from black colored animals altogether. The Red Norfolks are of the same family, but the taste of the English breeder led them to breed a red variety. Bred on richer soil and in more fertile regions than the Galloways, the Red Norfolks are now the larger cattle. All Senator Ferguson's Galloways are jet black. Their hair is glossy and close to the skin, and they are of the softness of silk. "I can get from \$10 to \$15 more for a Galloway hide," said the Senator, "than for that of any other breed, so you see that is an important feature of the breed." The Senator is killed before they are long stabled to realize this price, as when kept anything like a longer period under cover they injure the value of the hide by scratching off the hair in places. Then they are easy to feed and are better grazers than any other cattle in the country. They can stay out later in the autumn, and will eat the coarsest grasses in the fields that the Ayrshires and Shorthorns will not touch. Therefore they do not have to be fattened. They do not have horns, which are the eyes of many people is another great advantage. Their milk is as rich in quality as that of the Jerseys, and the yield is as good in quantity. Senator Ferguson shows some magnificent looking specimens of these cattle—bulls, cows and heifers—which have attracted much more than ordinary attention.

In sheep he shows Shropshire Downs in quantity. One fine animal is a ram brought from Hatter Davies at Charlottetown exhibition, and another is the ram "Tartar," of his own breeding, which the Senator has just sold to W. Hubbard, of Sussex. The Shropshires are hardy sheep, with a close, short wool that stands the weather. They do not have horns, which is their natural covering that can keep out of doors all night in a dry snowstorm without injury; in fact, they prefer it to staying under cover. Some of the Senator's sheep have had the average of 19 lbs. of wool.

Senator Ferguson said the animals he brought here were, with three exceptions, not the ones shown at the recent Charlottetown exhibition, but were drafted from his farm. He could send along a third drive if necessary. He took 15 individual prizes at Charlottetown for sheep out of 18 entries, and 12 prizes out of 18 entries—all that were off in the class.

Talking of the sheep trade, Senator Ferguson said nothing could be worse than the manner in which Prince Edward Island conducted the business. In teal of selling their little lambs to the Americans at a very low figure, thereby sending away so much raw material, the farmers should feed them till they were yearling, and then send them to the English and West India markets, where they would bring remunerative prices. "Keep the lambs and grow less oats," was his advice. "I buy my oats now cheaper than I can raise them."

Hon. Senator Ferguson, in addition to a host of prizes for cattle and sheep, carried a prize for the horses he exhibited. (St. John Gazette.)

In a conversation with a Gazette reporter, Senator Ferguson said he was greatly pleased with the fair play used at this exhibition, and hoped that it would prove a financial success. He expressed his delight at the exhibit of industries, and said that the show represented in many ways a combination of larger cities. Senator Ferguson also expressed his satisfaction at the prompt manner in which the I. C. R. and the P. E. I. Navigation Company transported his herd to the exhibition.
