LOUIS FRECHETTE, father of the Canadian poet laureate, died on the 3rd, at Hochelaga, aged seventy. He was a native of St. Nicholas, Lothbriens Co., and took an active part in the construction of Montreal Harbor and the Lachine Canal.

THE Times, in a forecast of the English harvest, says: "Wheat will not nearly amount to a fair average crop—that is, it will be no better than for the last five years. Barley promises rather less than an average yield. Oats are good."

THE Christian Brothers of Ottawa have notified the Separate School Board that they intend to leave St. Patrick's and St. Anne's Schools. This is owing to the recent trouble with the board. Lay teachers will be appointed. The Christian Brother's High School has consequently been done away with.

THE Windsor Mail says:—"It is reported at Wolfville and elsewhere, that the Senate of Acadia University, Wolfville, have nominated Rev. E. M. Kierstead, M. A., new pastor of the Baptist Church, Windsor, to the chair of Professor of Mental Philosophy, made vacant by the resignation of Dr. Schurman."

MOUNT ALLISON.—The first term of the collegiate year of the Sackville institutions will open August 24th. Matriculation examinations will begin Friday, 25th. Two prizes of \$25 each are offered for general competition, and one each, of the same amount, to the Yarmouth and P. E. Island districts respectively.

Two Montreal "drummers" hired a horse of Mr. J. W. McDonald, of Hopewell, N. S., on Thursday last, and overdrove him in the heat so that he died two hours afterwards. They subsequently made their escape, but one of them was arrested by the Sheriff at Pictou, just as he was getting on board the Island boat.

M. P. RYAN, Collector of Customs at Montreal, and Commissioner Johnson, of Ottawa, have been in consultation relative to the late seizure of custom goods. It seems that an amicable settlement has been arrived at by all concerned and that measures will be taken to prevent, if possible, a recurrence of these infringements of the law.

CUSTOMS.—The receipts at the Toronto Custom House on the first instant were the largest in the history of the port, amounting to \$37,523.33. The customs receipts at Montreal the past month amounted to \$998,490.40, an increase of \$205,618.37 over July, 1881. The receipts of Aug. 1 alone were \$47,574.28. The value of the imports into the port of New York last week exceeded the exports by \$3,112,000. The excess of imports for the same week last year was \$26,000.

INBABTANTS at the west end of the town were very much annoyed during the small hours of the morning, by the incessant barking of dogs, and the inordinate roarings of cattle. The dogs evidently thought that the sun was rising to heat them bark, and the cows were determined not to be outdone, in the vocal line, by the rising sun sonata of the dogs. Night was made hideous enough by the sleep destroying yells, and we hope that suitable measures will be taken for ensuring peace and repose to the tired sleepers in the neighborhood.

A CORRESPONDENT in the Sandwich Islands, under date of the 16th July last, reports good times on these Islands. All our P. E. Island boys there, appear to be doing well, particularly, Messrs. J. F. McKenzie, Richard Douglas and Edward Robins, formerly of this city. Mr. McKenzie has commenced business in Honolulu on his "own hook," while the others are in excellent situations.

FORT EDWARD has been reconstructed from plans submitted to the Department of Militia and Defence, by Major Irving, of this city. The reconstruction is of the sunken-barricade style, which is the most improved system of earth-works. The work was performed by Mr. Robert Palmer, under the supervision of Major Irving. It is pronounced to be a first-class job and very creditable to all concerned.

Found Drowned.

THE body of the man found drowned in the Hillsborough on Thursday, is doubtless that of Thomas Millar, a Scotch farm laborer. Mr. John McLeod, tailor, Upper Queen Street, states that from the description of the deceased's left hand, published in the EXAMINER, and from the description of his hair and left eye, as given by the Coroner, Dr. McLeod, he has no doubt on his mind that the body found is that of Thomas Millar. Mr. McLeod also says that Millar was slightly deranged in mind from the effects of a sunstroke he received some years ago, and that he has since wandered a great deal through the country. When last heard of he was working on a farm in Lot 48, and when drowned must have been on his way to or from the city. The deceased was known to have at times considerable money in his possession, but his corpse, with the exception of one mark upon his throat, did not show any appearance of foul play. We should be obliged to any person who can throw light on Millar's disappearance to correspond with us.

Crapaud Notes.

There has been considerable excitement of late in this vicinity. A bear was seen, first near Stordy's Mills, then in a field near the residence of Mr. Thomas Rogerson. Two little girls who were berry picking in the field ran home crying, and stated that they had seen bruin. The next place he put in an appearance was in a small grove near the Parsonage. Some parties were here berry picking, and observing something strange in the grove gave the alarm. The people turned out en masse, armed with pitchforks, pistols, guns, and other articles of war too numerous to mention, to capture poor bruin, but they did not succeed, and he is still at large. The matter has been seriously talked over, and the general opinion is, that it was not a bear, but a black cow.

Arriving there they spread their white linen and good things prepared by the ladies, on a beautiful green near McQuarries Lobster Factory.
