ABADAN, Iran, April 20 - (AP) - The Anglo-Iranian Oil Company announced today it will give a 36-per-cent bonus to workers who stayed on the job during the oil field strikes. This was an attempt to start a back to work movement both in the oil fields and at the Abadan refinery, whose production has been cut to one-fourth the normal production for eight straight days.

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Death of Former Mayor of Alberton

One of Prince County's leading lawyers and a former Mayor of Alberton, and member of the Legislature, Mr. Wilfred Tanton died in the Prince Edward Island Hospital on Thursday. He was 71 years of age.

Mr. Tanton had been in failing health for some time and only eight days before his death had entered hospital for treatment. In addition to building up a large legal practise Mr. Tanton was keenly interested in civic affairs and devoted much of his time to the betterment of his community and country.

He served as Mayor of Alberton for five years, from 1936 to 1944, and previously had represented the First District of Prince in the Legislative Assembly for one term as a Conservative member.

Born in Sherbrooke, near Summerside, he was the youngest son of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Tanton. He developed his law practise in Alberton where he later became town magistrate. Surviving are his wife, the former Lillian Cox of Charlottetown, and two sisters, Elizabeth, Mrs. Patterson, Denver, Colorado, and Mrs. Maud McDonald, Summerside.

The funeral will be held this afternoon with services at St. Peter's Cathedral, Charlottetown at two o'clock.

Many Apply For Jobs In Labrador

The Summerside office of the Unemployment Insurance Commission was a busy place yesterday as applications were being received for work on an American defence construction project in Labrador. Announcement had been made the previous day that 4,000 men are being recruited through the National Employment Offices in the Maritimes and yesterday the Summerside office was crowned all day.

Thirty-five applications were taken and many who could not be served are expected to return today. Of those who applied for jobs the bulk described themselves as truck drivers or laborers but there were also men in such categories as steamfitters, carpenters, plumbers, mechanics, pipe fitters and cement finishers.

Applications are sent to the Moncton Employment Office and those who are accepted must undergo a physical examination. If they are found to be physically fit they will be called to Moncton and flown from there to the location of the work in Labrador.

Epidemic Disease In Chinese Army

TOKYO, April 20 - (AP) - Brig. Gen. James Simons, consultant to the United States surgeon-general, today reported that captured North Korean and Red Chinese troops "have had a unduly-high incidence" of epidemic diseases such as smallpox, typhus and typhoid. Simons said United Nations forces have suffered little from those diseases.

Protests Omission Of P. E. I. Member

OTTAWA, April 20 - (Special) - Protest against the omission of a representative of Prince Edward Island from the special committee of the Commons named to revise the Dominion Elections Act was registered in the House of Commons this afternoon by W. Chester S. McLure, Progressive Conservative member for Queen's.

Mr. McLure, who has for years past rigidly insisted on Prince Edward Island being given representation on all committees on which those from other Provinces are sitting, brought the matter up at the opening of the House today on a question of privilege. His objective, he intimated to The Guardian, was to see that the rights of the Province are scrupulously observed at Ottawa.

On this issue, Mr. McLure said: "I rise on a question of privilege. At page 2173 of Hansard for April 19, the honorable member for Portage-Neepawa (W. G. Weir, chief Liberal whip), moved that certain members comprise the special committee on the Dominion Elections Act, and then the names are recorded. The motion was agreed to.

"Before the motion was agreed to, I asked whether my Province of Prince Edward Island was represented on the committee. The question was not answered, nor does it appear in Hansard. I find the following numbers of members representing the different Provinces: Four from British Columbia; three from Alberta; four from Saskatchewan; two from Manitoba; seven from Ontario; six from Quebec; one from New Brunswick; two from Nova Scotia; none from Prince Edward Island and one from Newfoundland.

"Therefore I object to the special committee on the ground that it does not represent all the Provinces of Canada. My question of privilege is: Why should any one Province without representation be dictated to by the other Provinces?"

Mr. McLure's question was taken under advisement by Mr. Speaker and by Mr. Weir.

ALLIED COMMANDER

(Continued from Page 1) were hurled against Allied units pushing up the Hantan River valley, eight miles southeast of Chorwon, which commands access to the main Communist supply network to the north. More than 600-000 Reds are believed north of Chorwon, which is 18 miles north of the 38th parallel.

One counter-attack was broken up in 15 minutes by powerful Allied artillery fire. The other Red force still resisted by late afternoon. Butting into high ground from another direction, Allied units Friday night fought a strong Communist force near the main road leading southwest of Chorwon. Thursday, a U.N. tank-infantry force punched within three miles of the rubble town before withdrawing.

At Eighth Army headquarters, the stubborn Chinese resistance before Chorwon was considered probably a holding action to cover another withdrawal of their main body of troops.

Action along the rest of the rain-soaked 120-mile Korean front was light Friday. Tank-supported infantry teams ranged miles ahead of the lines. They met little resistance.

(Continued from Page 1) night when 1,500,000 impatient admirers turned out to cheer him on his drive into the city from the airport. It grew into a wild acclaim that swept through Manhattan like a storm wherever the General appeared, waving and smiling to the people.

The MacArthur parade wound through 15 miles of city streets banked with masses of people in a holiday mood. The crowds began gathering three hours before the parade. It was a day of bright, warm sunshine.

Downtown office workers were given a holiday. The younger fry shinnied up trees and lamp posts and onto fences. Police Commissioner Thomas Murphy, who announced the official crowd estimate, said the Broadway crowd was packed 100 deep at places.

The turnout was almost double that of 1945 when Gen. Douglas MacArthur returned to the United States in 1945.

As Others See Us

The following sketches of the Party leaders in the Provincial general election campaign have been prepared by Canadian Press and are being widely published in newspapers across Canada:

Conservative Leader Richard Reginald Bell, new leader of the Prince Edward Island Progressive Conservative party is a lawyer with the soil on his boots. For he takes time out from a busy law practice to keep a practical eye on his prize Shorthorn herd, his Yorkshire pigs and 500 rich acres.

Last June he was elected party leader, succeeding the veteran Dr. William J. P. MacMillan, former Premier. Now 49 years old, Mr. Bell will seek re-election in the Second District of Queen's in the April 26 general election.

Born in Charlottetown, he was educated at Prince of Wales College and after being admitted to the bar in 1927 practised law in his native city.

Mr. Bell is a former president of the P. E. I. Shorthorn Breeders Association and is still a director of the organization. For the last few years he has been a director of the Provincial Exhibition Association and Charlottetown Driving Park.

He entered politics first as secretary of the Progressive Conservative Party, a position he held until he was elected to the Legislature for the Second District of Queen's in the 1943 election. He was re-elected in 1947. The present campaign is his first as party leader.

Mr. Bell is a Lieutenant in the 20th Battery (Reserve) he is a past president of the Charlottetown Board of Trade and the P. E. I. Law Society. He is a member of Charlottetown Curling and Golf Clubs.

He married Helena Langslow Rogers of Charlottetown in 1934. They have a son and a daughter.

C. C. F. Leader

Douglas MacFarlane, 34, is the new president of the C. C. F. party in Prince Edward Island and will lead the party in the April 26 provincial general election. He succeeded George Wotton. Both men have been unsuccessful in previous elections. In fact their party has never elected a candidate.

He began farm farming himself and then branched out and became interested in pure bred cattle, taking on the side, his master of arts in economics at Acadia. He developed an internationally-famous herd and between 1927 and 1933 won probably more prizes and championships than any other Canadian. He was the first Breeder's shield of the Holstein-Friesian Association.

He tried politics nationally in 1921 but was defeated as a farmers' Progressive candidate. He was successful when he first tried
