## Dodgers Nip Flyers 2-1 In Baseball Thriller

Charlie Ryan's Dodgers pushed across a pair of runs in the last of the ninth inning to overcome a 1-0 Flyers lead and win a tense squeaker from the league leaders 2-1 last night.

Buck Whitlock led off the inning with his second double of the night and went to third on Irv MacKinnon's line single into right. Charlie Ryan was walked intentionally to load the bases with none out, but Fiddler MacDonald's strategy backfired when Jay lofted a long fly into right and Whitlock scored after the catch. Squarebrieggs followed with another long fly into right and MacKinnon, who had advanced to third on Jay's fly, crossed the plate with the winner.

It was an exciting, tense ball game all the way with the Flyers breaking the scoreless tie in the seventh when Ready led off with a fine single and scored on MacNeil's double into left center. Ronnie MacNeil tried valiantly to hold on to the lead but the Dodgers were not to be denied.

# Yankees Take Two Game Lead As Berra Belts Homer For 1-0 Win Over Chicago

NEW YORK (AP) — Yogi Berra belted his 17th home run to lead off the sixth inning and break up a pitching duel between Chicago's Dick Donovan and New York's Tommy Byrne Tuesday night as the Yankees knocked off the White Sox 1-0 and padded their American League lead to two games.

The defeat left Chicago in a second-place tie with Cleveland, which was beaten at Boston.

Byrne, a comeback lefthander who has become manager Casey Stengel's ace in the hole, gave up just four singles. It was his ninth victory against two defeats.

CINCINNATI (AP) — Don Newcombe racked up his 17th Brooklyn Dodger victory and completed his 12th game as the National League leading Brooks edged Cincinnati Reds 4-2 Tuesday night.

The 29-year-old righthander has lost only one game.

BOSTON (AP) — Frank Sullivan's stylish five-hit pitching backed by home runs from Ted Williams and Sammy White paced the irrepressible Boston Red Sox to a 5-1 victory Tuesday night over the Cleveland Indians.

Grady Hatton and Jim Piersall also contributed key hits to the Sox triumph—their 36th of their last 47 games.

Larry Doby homered for the winners.

Herb Score, Cleveland starter, raised his strikeout total to 154 by fanning six in his 4 2/3-inning stint but found the Red Sox jinx too much as he lost his ninth game against an equal number of victories.

CHICAGO (AP) — New York Giants blew a 5-0 lead Tuesday and then bounced back to edge Chicago Cubs 6-5 in 12 innings as Al Dark delivered the game-winning single.

## Doug Ford Wins P.G.A. Title

DETROIT (AP)—Doug Ford, an expert shotmaker who needed only a title to stamp him as a great golfer, won the United States Professional Golfers Association championship on his first try by defeating Cary Middlecoff 4 and 3 Tuesday in a thrill-packed match that ended on the 33rd hole.

Ford, 32, has been a pro less than six years and only became eligible for the PGA tournament this year. Playing almost perfect golf for an entire week and refusing to bend under pressure, he swept through six strong opponents in a succession of sub-par rounds to take the title.

He is only the second player in the 37-year history of the PGA tournament to win the title on his first attempt and the fourth qualifying medalist to go clear through the only player before him who won this rugged match play test the first time he tried it was Tom Creavy of Albany, N.Y., in 1931.

HEAT SLOWS GARY Middlecoff, the year's top money winner, shot a 67 against Ford's 68 in the morning. Then he began to make mistakes.

Middlecoff said the torrid weather was a deciding factor. "I was so exhausted I couldn't think," he said. "I'm getting too old to play this kind of golf."

Ford said the heat didn't bother him at all.
