The Cronin Murder Trial.

THE TESTIMONY FOR THE DEFENCE CONTINUED.

CHICAGO, Nov. 19.—Redmond McDonald, a policeman of the East Chicago avenue station, was the first witness in the Cronin case to-day.

The witness returned from the cemetery about five o'clock and went to Garity's saloon (Whalen yesterday was positive it was six o'clock) and did not see Martin Burke at the funeral, nor did he see Dan Coughlin at Garity's saloon.

Wm. Mulcahey, an employe of Sullivan, the ice man, testified that a man resembling Coughlin called at the ice man's residence in April, and asked him if he knew Kunze.

On cross-examination the State's Attorney endeavored to elicit from the witness a statement that in his evidence before the coroner's jury he had stated that he did not hear the conversation between O'Sullivan and the elder Carlson, but the witness persisted that he never so testified.

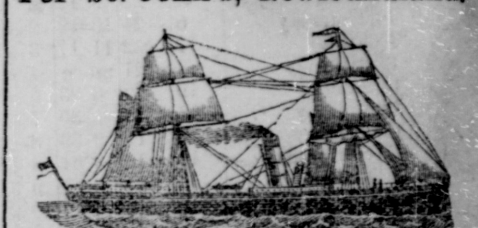
