## Levels Called Disquieting Maquarrie Makes Plea For N Falout Survey

UNITED NATIONS (CP)—  
A record increase in radioactive fallout in Canada during the summer points up the need for a comprehensive study on radiation, the United Nations was told today.

Canadian delegate Health Maquarrie spoke in the General Assembly's special committee in support of a Canadian resolution, co-sponsored by 40 other countries, urging a world-wide study on atomic radiation.

The only other speaker at debate on the Canadian resolution opened Friday, said the fact that no agreement had been reached on a nuclear test ban emphasizes the need for such studies, Maquarrie said. He said that the average concentration of strontium-90 in milk reached record levels.

## 57 COLLISIONS TIE UP FREEWAY
