Drowned in a Mine.

BETWEEN TEN AND FIFTEEN MINERS MET THEIR DEATH.

MINERSVILLE, Pa., April 24.—This town, which is situated about four miles from Pottsville, is greatly excited over a dreadful accident that occurred this afternoon at Lytle colliery whereby 10 or 15 men are said to have lost their lives by the flooding of the mine with an immense body of water that burst through the old workings.

The places where the accident occurred is a new coal operation that is being opened up on an immense scale by the Style Coal Company, the principal stockholders of which are the Pennsylvania Railroad officials and Scranton capitalists.

The rescue party who were cutting across, heading through to the saddle in which two of the miners were supposed to have been, broke through and took out William Bell, alive and sound. The rescue is still going on, of those still imprisoned six are Italians and two Americans.
