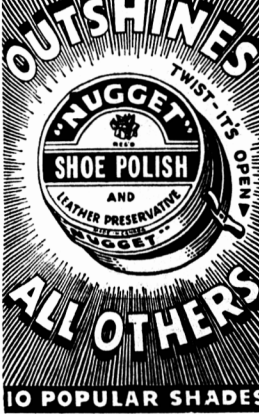

Prospector Sold Phony Gold Bricks

MONTEAL, Feb. 20 — (CP) — Adelard Bergeron, Val D'or, Que., prospector charged with selling phony gold bricks, today testified for the crown and identified Eugene Deschambault and others who are charged as co-conspirators.

Bergeron, awaiting preliminary hearing on fraud and conspiracy charges, testified at Deschambault's preliminary hearing. Deschambault, from St. Johns, Que., was committed for trial in court of Queen's Bench.

Bergeron said Deschambault, 36, was a member of a gang which sold Armand Payette of St. Johns a \$50 chunk of brass as a gold brick worth \$8,000. He said another of the gang was Jean Demers of St. Johns, also awaiting preliminary hearing.

Bergeron testified that Payette gave Deschambault \$1000 for a truck and \$3000 to buy stolen high-grade gold ore. He said the money was split among Deschambault, Demers, himself and another man.

British Airways To Impose Landing Tax

LONDON, Feb. 20 — (CP) — Imposition of a landing tax on all fare-paying passengers arriving at British state-owned airports has been announced by the Ministry of Transport and Civil Aviation.

The charges, effective May 1, will be five shillings for those arriving from European destinations and seven shillings six pence for each passenger from Canada, the United States and other parts of the world. No charge will be made for transit passengers who continue their journey without a break.

A ministry statement said the tax was being introduced as a contribution to the mounting cost of providing services and facilities for passengers at airports. During the last financial year these operations resulted in a heavy deficit, spokesmen said.

At Montreal, Trans-Canada Air Lines officials said a similar procedure is followed at some Caribbean points.

Since the British announcement was made only yesterday, Canadian air carrier officials said they could not say how it would work on Canada-to-the U. K. fares. But they noted that in the case of Canadian flights to Nassau and Jamaica, the passengers, rather than the air carrier, pay the local impost for landing and take-off.

Saskatchewan Rink Clinches High School Curling Championship

Quebec Aces Goalie Gets Sixth Shutout

MONCTON, N. B., Feb. 20 — (CP)—Gary Thode's Saskatchewan rink clinched the Canadian high school curling championship tonight for a second consecutive year with a one-sided 10-3 win over Manitoba, represented by Ron Gray's Belmont rink.

The champions ended eight rounds without a loss, Manitoba their nearest rivals, has suffered two defeats. The four-day bonspiel will end with one round tomorrow.

Thode's foursome kept the St. John's Trophy in the bag as early as the fourth end tonight, when they had five against one for Manitoba. A four in the sixth end left no doubt of the result.

The sliding Saskatoon boys gave a real display of knockout in the last two bald ends. Their marksmanship in knocking out their opponents' rocks was practically unflinching.

An incident after the match exemplified their confidence throughout. When a young girl spectator asked Thode for his autograph, he pulled out slips of paper already bearing his signature. Other members of the rink were similarly equipped.

On the basis of cold figures, with a 5-3 record against Manitoba's 6-2, Alberta and Nova Scotia will be in the running for runner-up honours. However, Nova Scotia will face the strong Manitoba rink tomorrow while Alberta tangles with British Columbia.

Tied with four wins and an equal number of losses, are Quebec and British Columbia. New Brunswick has three and five. Prince Edward Island and Northern Ontario two and six each, and Ontario one and seven.

The tightest contest tonight was an 11-ender won 8-7 by Nova Scotia over Prince Edward Island. And the biggest end of the night was a six by British Columbia, which defeated Ontario 14-5. In other eight round matches, Northern Ontario beat New Brunswick 9-4 and Alberta set back Quebec 9-6.

Earlier in the day, Thode's boys achieved their seventh straight win when they edged British Columbia 7-6 in an extra end thriller.

Olympic Hockey

OSLO, Feb. 20 — (CP) — The four hockey teams which hadn't won a game in the Olympic round-robin series played tonight, and from the two games only one victory emerged.

Finland defeated Norway 5-2 but Germany and Poland played to a 4-4 tie, the first tie so far.

Tomorrow night Canada meets Switzerland, the team that lost to the United States last night. The United States faces undefeated Sweden, which has had a rest of two nights. The other games are Finland vs. Czechoslovakia and Norway vs. Germany.

Olympic Standings

OSLO, Feb. 20 — (CP) — Canada picked up a point in the team standing tonight at the Olympics on the sixth place scored by Miss Suzanne Morrow of Toronto in the women's figure skating championship.

Canada's only other points were the 3 1-2 scored by Gordon Aulley of Winnipeg in tying for third place last Saturday in the 500-metre speed skating race.

Jeanette Altwegg's victory in the figure skating gave Britain 10 points, its first of the current games.

Norway still remains far out in front, with 101 picking up seven points today in the 50-kilometre ski marathon.

Humez Decides Not To Meet Gavilan For Title

LILLE, France, Feb. 20 — (AP) — Charles Humez, European welterweight champion, said tonight he had decided not to meet Kid Gavilan of Cuba in a proposed March 28 bout for the world title.

Gavilan had been recognized in the United States as the world champion, but the International Boxing Union withheld recognition pending a meeting with Humez. The action of the Frenchman leaves Gavilan the undisputed champion.

Humez, 24, said he would give up his European title because he can't make the weight in his class.

After extensive training for a recent bout in Paris with Norman Hayes, Boston welterweight, Humez weighed in at 156 pounds. The Frenchman's managers said it would be dangerous for Humez to make another effort to get under the welterweight limit of 147 pounds.

Drilling For Oil In Newfoundland

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Feb. 20 — (CP) — A small crew is punching its way along a trail on the sparsely-settled northwest coast of Newfoundland to St. Paul's Inlet, where an oil drilling rig will be set up.

A. R. Leckseid, in charge of the operation for John Fox, Boston Financier, said in an interview here Tuesday there is no definite estimate on when drilling will start.

Mr. Fox has leased from the Newfoundland Government the land on which oil was found 54 years ago. Small-scale efforts were made to bring out the oil on a commercial basis at that time without success. The drill now en route to St. Paul's is capable of going to a depth of 2,100 feet.

Another U. S. Hearing On Seaway Opens Monday

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20 — (AP) — The Senate Foreign Relations Committee voted eight to four today to open a hearing Monday on a bill to authorize the St. Lawrence Seaway and Power Project.

It agreed to end the hearing by Chairman Tom Connally (Dem. Tex.), an opponent of the \$818,000,000 project, told reporters of the committee's action. He explained it "compels the committee to hold hearings but it does not compel it to act."

Canada has announced plans to build the project alone if the U. S. does not make it a joint undertaking.

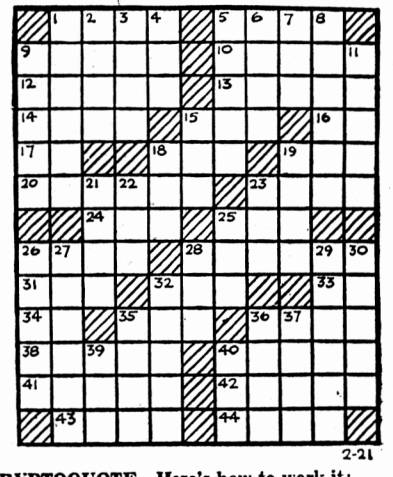
