

Parents Named to School Board

SUMMERISDE — The appointment of Keith T. Lapp as a member of the Board of School Trustees was approved at last night's meeting of town council but was not unanimous. Four councillors voted in favor while two opposed the motion.

The resolution stated that Mr. Lapp was appointed as a member of the school board for a period of three years. After the resolution was moved and seconded, Coun. D. Alex MacDonald said he felt that James M. Harris should get the appointment, Coun. Donald Ross said there is no doubt Mr. Lapp can handle the position capably but he would not be willing to accept the post.

Mayor J. E. Morrison told council he had brought the matter up with Mr. Harris on two occasions, and on the last occasion informed Mr. Harris that council would have to have a decision by last Thursday. His words should be heard nothing from Mr. Harris.

Coun. Perry agreed with Coun. MacDonald stating that Mr. Harris had been a resident of the town longer than Mr. Lapp, and that he had voted against the resolution which was approved four to two.

Mayor Morrison said he had heard rumors that the experimental run on Central Street would be a success. He stated that if the rumors are correct the town should acquire the street as a park, as this he felt it would be ideal for its purpose.

Old Fire Halls Designated For Use S'ide Police Dept.

SUMMERISDE — The old fire hall is to be renovated and used as a police station and police court it was revealed at last night's meeting of the town council presided over by Mayor J. Ernest Morrison with all councillors present.

Also on hand were Town Manager J. A. Brophy, Town Clerk J. E. Cameron and Town Engineer J. C. McKenna.

It is the opinion of the town council that the old fire hall will provide suitable accommodations for the police department, allowing the present police office to be utilized by other departments. Plans and specifications for renovating the old fire hall are now in the process of completion.

Mr. H. B. Schurman said possibly the present police office would be used for the town engineer's office as he now has very cramped quarters. As well, he would go to the shelter in a national emergency had been drawn up. He asked the council for further direction for the committee as present plans are complete.

Correspondence read by Town Clerk Cameron included a letter regarding establishment of a Shell service station on the corner of Ryan and North Granville streets opposite Crest Lanes. The letter was in the form of an application for a building permit in the value of \$27,000.

ALREADY ZONED — Coun. Schurman said this area has already been designated as a residential zone and if approved of the application we are leaving ourselves wide open for the establishment of supermarkets and every other type of commercial enterprise.

Coun. Leo Wood said it was not fair to the other service station operators already established as it was his feeling they were enough of these in town now. Mr. Brophy stated the firm would have to get approval from the board of utilities but that the board could not interfere with the town zoning.

Coun. Wood moved that the application for establishment of a service station at the corner of Ryan and North Granville streets be shelved, which was approved. Mr. Cameron read a letter from the P.E.I. central committee headed by William Hayward which enlisting that Summerside would receive up to 30 cents per capita for decorations and illumination in addition to the 50 cents already announced for a permanent community project.

CIVIL DEFENCE — Coun. George Key, Jr., reported to council that his civil defence committee, appointed some seven months ago, and authorized to draw up plans for construction of a fall out shelter in the basement of the new fire hall, said it appears that approximately \$10,000 and that a list of names of those who would go of the shelter in a national emergency had been drawn up. He asked the council for further direction for the committee as present plans are complete.
