THE roads are much cut up, owing to the heavy rain, and much traffic of the past few days, a little dry weather and they will be as good as ever.

JOHN LOUGHRAN, of County Line, was, to-day, imprisoned by the Inspector of Licenses for non-payment of a fine imposed for violation of the Scott Act.

SENT TO PRISON FOR LIFE.—In the Supreme Judicial Court, at Bangor, Me., on Sept. 13th, Mary Flynn of East Hampton, for infanticide, was sentenced to State prison for life.

CONCERT.—On or about the 12th October next, a concert, in aid of the Poor Fund of the Women's Temperance Benevolent Society, will be given in the Y. M. C. A. Hall, at which the best local musical talent will be represented.

WE would remind our readers of the Temperance meeting this evening, in the Y. M. C. A. Hall. Rev. G. W. Hodgson, and Rev. Mr. Burwash are to speak. There should be a full house. The Scott Act will likely get an airing.

WE messrs HARRY RINGS, Esq., has purchased Messrs Nicholson and Campbell's share in the celebrated six-legged calf. Mr. B. intends to raise the natural curiosity on his farm at Riverside. He thinks "Soany will prove a bonanza."

DR. ROBERT MACNAIR, of Leith, Scotland, formerly of Charlottetown and St. John several years ago, so well and favorably known in these Maritime Provinces, is at present on a visit to Halifax. He officiated in two of the churches there yesterday.

GENERAL LEARD, on the 15th inst., inspected the militia forces in camp at Aylesford, N. S. He showed every consideration for the men's comfort in only having them out during intervals between showers. After minutely inspecting every man, he expressed great satisfaction with the camp and appearance of the men, considering the short time spent in drill.

ST. JOHN is to have a Clerical Conference of the Church of England clergy belonging to Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. The conference will take place on October 24th and 25th. We see from the programme that the Rev. G. W. Hodgson speaks on the subject of "How to interest people in the life and work of the church." The Rev. Theo. Riechy, Rector of Summerside leads the discussion on Missionary work.

PREVIOUS to his departure for Halifax, Mr. Frank Kennedy, Agent of the Acadia, and other Insurence Companies, was tendered a complimentary dinner by his numerous friends. The affair took place at the Osborne House on Saturday evening, and passed off very pleasantly. Mr. Kennedy left this morning, accompanied by the best wishes of our citizens. He will take a permanent position in the Bank of Nova Scotia. We wish him success.

The members of the Junior Liberal-Conservative Club, presented Mr. Frank Kennedy, the late Secretary, with a handsome Gold Watch Guard, on the eve of his departure from the Island.

The flag-ship "Northampton," accompanied by the tender "Foam," arrived at the scene of the wreck of H. M. S. "Phoenix" on Saturday morning. The weather was very rough, and it was impossible to work at the wreck. The "Northampton" therefore anchored in East Point, and the "Foam" anchored in South Harbor. This morning they went to work and saved the guns and balance of the stores. The vessel will be a total loss. The facts of the stranding are not generally known. It is said the commander and navigating officer were on the bridge during the thickness of the storm. They never saw the light until a very short distance from it. While the Captain believed it was Cape George Light, the Navigator thought it was East Point light. He took out his watch to time the lights revolutions, and while thus engaged the vessel struck the reef. The Commander will be court-martialed.

Death of Mrs. Trainor.

ON Saturday an inquest was held at the residence of Mr. J. J. O'Reilly, by Dr. Conroy, Coroner for Queen's County, in view of the body of Mrs. James Trainor, of Mill Cove, who died of accidental poisoning. The following is the evidence taken and the verdict returned:—

JAMES TRAINOR, (sworn)—I am the husband of the deceased. I came to town yesterday. My wife asked me to bring home some magnesia and rhubarb. I called at Mr. Fraser's and asked him for some poison to kill rats. He gave me the rat poison himself and the clerk gave me the rhubarb and magnesia. The poison had no label whatever upon it, and Mr. Fraser told me to mix it with oatmeal and water and set it on a plate for the rats. I put the poison in my coat pocket and the rhubarb in my rear pocket. I hung up my coat on arriving home and soon after I offered her the rhubarb and magnesia. She told me she had already taken it, that the children took it out of my pocket and gave it to her. I then gave her salt and water as an emetic, and she soon began vomiting. I then got a horse and wagon and sent Mr. Hughes in to town with her. She complained of a burning heat in the stomach before she left the house.

JAMES TRAINOR (re-called).—Mr. Fraser told me to be very cautious about the poison, and to guard against its poisoning any creature about the house. There might have been a label on the poison without my observing it.

THOMAS HUGHES (sworn)—I was awakened up last night by the daughter of the deceased, who told me that her mother had taken poison in mistake. I was requested to come to town with the deceased and so as to get medical assistance. I started for town with the deceased and came to Dr. Beer's office. The deceased vomited all the way coming in. The doctor gave her some medicine and gave me directions as to how she should be treated. I then brought her to her sister's house, Mrs. J. J. O'Reilly's, where I left her. Dr. Beer told me to have a clergyman see her as he thought her very dangerously ill.

JAMES ROBERTSON (sworn)—I was at Mr. Trainor's house last evening. Mr. Trainor told me his wife had taken rat poison in a mistake. I heard Mrs. Trainor (the deceased) say that she took a teaspoonful of poison in a mistake.

CATHERINE HUGHES (sworn)—I was awakened up last night to go over to Mrs. Trainor's, the deceased. I went over to the house and saw the deceased. She said she took about half a teaspoonful of the powder. She vomited some before she left the house, but did not seem very sick.

FRANK BEER, M. D., (sworn)—I was awakened up last night by Mr. Hughes who had deceased in charge. She told me she had taken about half a teaspoonful of a powder which she contained arsenic, and administered remedies in accordance. I then directed Mr. Hughes to take the deceased to her sisters, Mrs. J. J. O'Reilly's. The deceased had no pulse at the wrist when I saw her first. I had very little hope that the deceased would recover. The quantity of poison taken was in my opinion sufficient to cause death. I directed a clergyman to be sent for.

ELLEN CARMICHAEL, (sworn)—The deceased was brought to this house between three and four this morning. She was in charge of Mr. Hughes. She seemed very sick, and vomited several times. She told me she took rat poison in a mistake. I gave her some milk and water, and one of the powders the doctor ordered. I bathed her feet, and put mustard poultices to her stomach. She died between 7 and 8 o'clock.

JAMES J. O'REILLY, (sworn)—The deceased was brought to my house between 3 and 4 o'clock this morning. I gave her the powder at an interval of a little more than half an hour. She appeared to have pains in her stomach. She was very thirsty, but I thought it better to give her milk. I had no idea that deceased was going to die. I went for a clergyman at 10 minutes to 7, and when I returned she was dead.

P. G. FRASER (sworn)—I am engaged in the drug business in this city. I have no recollection of selling rat poison to Mr. Trainor yesterday. I frequently sell poison for destroying rats. The poison I sell contains arsenic. The powder here shown was not sold by me in its present form. It is mixed with some ingredient which I never use in mine. The poison I sell is arsenic pure. I always label the rat poison sold, and always give full directions as to how it should be used. I know of no regulations affecting druggists in the sale of arsenic as rat poison. I believe it to be customary among druggists to sell arsenic as a poison for rats and vermin.

After a short deliberation, the jury returned the following verdict:— "That the deceased came to her death from the effects of arsenic sold as rat poison, and taken by mistake in the place of medicine."

The jury wish to record their unqualified disapproval of the practice of selling violent poisons indiscriminately to the general public.

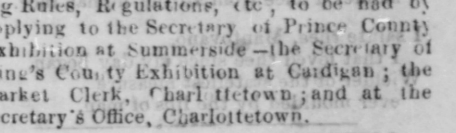

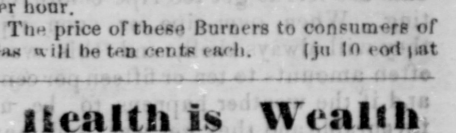
