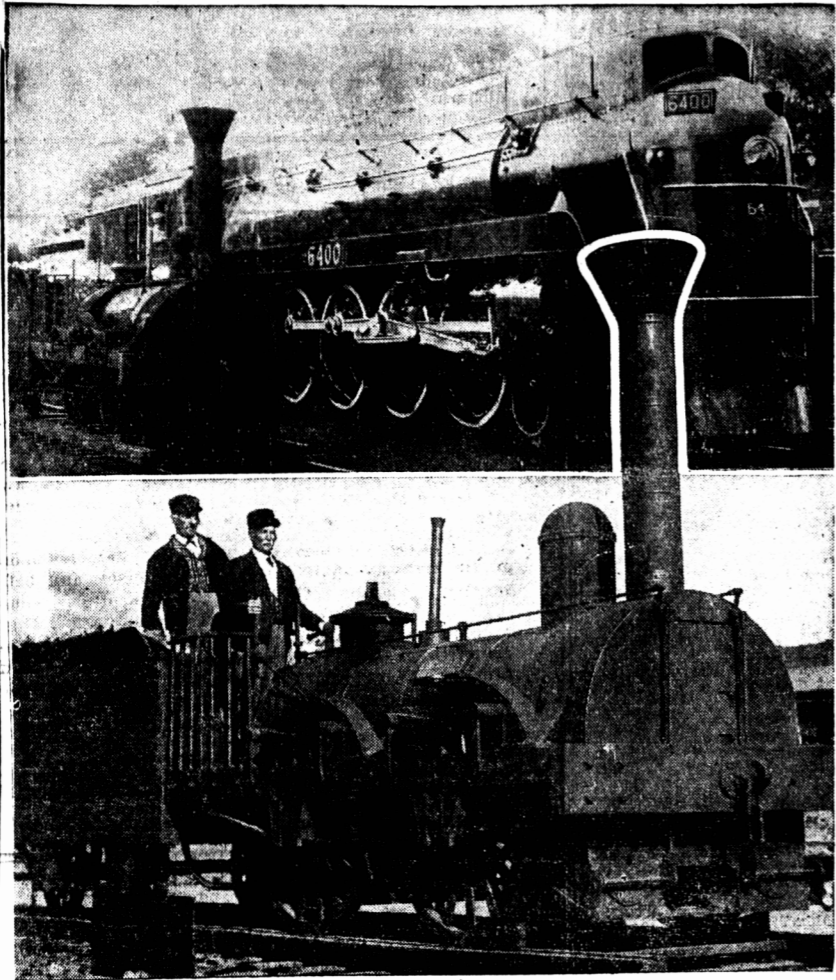
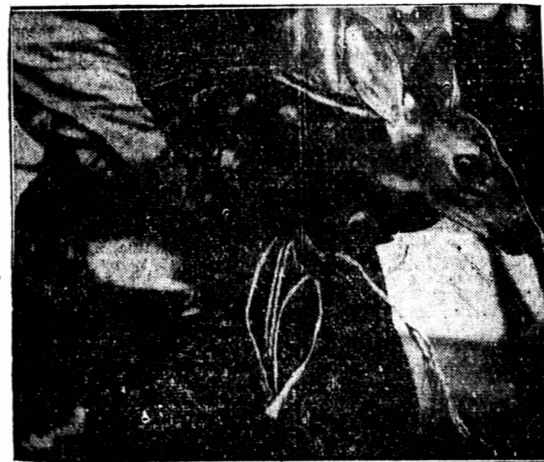
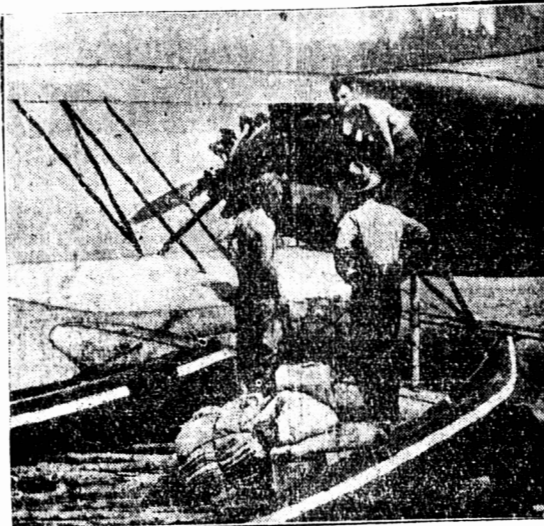

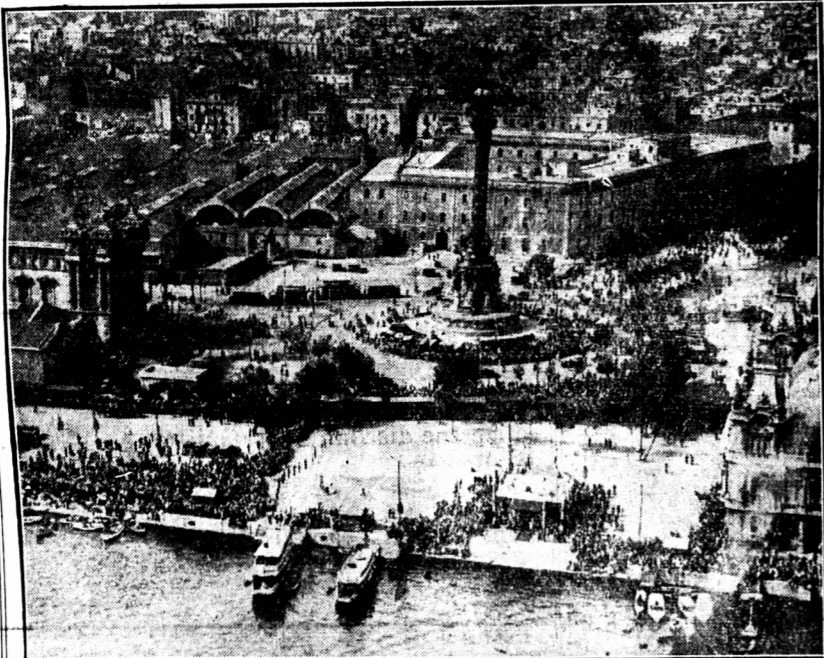
The advance made in the 100 years of steam railways in Canada is graphically illustrated in the above layout. The old timer is a reproduction of the first steam locomotive in Canada, operated in 1836. Beside her stands the gigantic streamlined "6400" of the Canadian National, the largest streamlined locomotive in the world. Both are taking part in the centennial celebrations of the opening of the Champlain and St. Lawrence railway. Engineers A. J. Shapter and G. F. Moran, both of whom have seen more than 50 years service are seen in the 21-foot full size model of Canada's first train. They are making a cross country tour. —Central Press Canadian Photo
