Council was told the 850 graves could be moved at a cost of \$39,000 or the area could be fenced and improved for \$33,350. They decided the land could be used for school purposes so voted on the move.

Council promised the bodies would be given priority in another cemetery.

## Probe Death Of Ontario Farmer

PUNNAM, Ont. (CP) — Police said Monday the death New Year's Eve of a 22-year-old London district farmer whose nude, charred body was found in a water-filled ditch, may have been suicide or homicide.

Jack Fishleigh was found dead in a foot of water. A post-mortem showed death was due to third-degree burns which covered the body but there were no marks of external violence.

Police said Fishleigh watched television at his father's home until about 10 p.m., then went to the barn to listen to western music on his radio. His uncle, Norman Bain, found the body, clothes burned off, the next day.

Police said a can of gasoline may have spilled over him. An empty can was found nearby.

## Yugoslav Sailors Released On Bond

OTTAWA, (CP)—Three Yugoslav sailors who jumped their ship in Vancouver and demanded political asylum in Canada on threats of suicide, have been released on bond and their case is still under study, an immigration spokesman said Tuesday.

The sailors, Srecko Baric, 18, Boro Andjelkovic, 23, and Bacio Celestin, 19, surrendered to immigration authorities in Vancouver last October after deserting the Yugoslav ship Bosna. The ship later sailed for Europe without them.

Immigration authorities ordered their deportation but an appeal was made to Ottawa after they told Jovan Vukic of the Serbian National Society that a return to Yugoslavia would mean their death before a firing squad. Vukic said the men are anti-Communist and have threatened suicide unless allowed to stay in Canada.

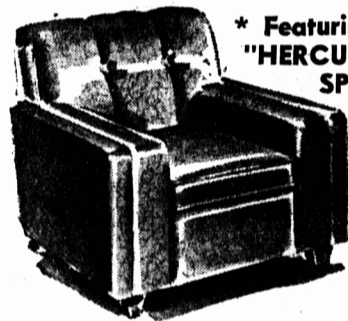
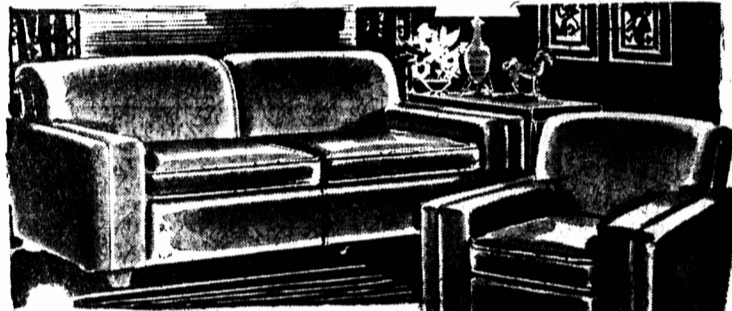

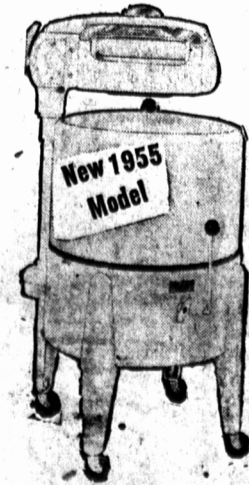
