

HOME AGAIN.

More Island Soldiers Return From Africa.

The Island soldiers returning from South Africa arrived in Charlottetown yesterday forenoon by the Minto, and were right heartily welcomed. Although the steamer arrived earlier than was expected there was a great number of people on the wharf. The city companies of militia with the band of the 82nd Battalion, and representatives of the City Council were also present.

As the steamer came up to the wharf the boys in khaki were the cynosure of all eyes, and as they came down the gangway they were heartily cheered.

After the relatives of the soldiers had extended them a hearty welcome the procession formed up under Colonel Longworth and proceeded to the drill shed, the line of march being along Water to Queen street, up Queen to Kent and down Kent to the shed. Here the returned soldiers were addressed by Col. Moore, Premier Farquharson and Rev. Mr. Fullerton. All expressed their pleasure at having the soldier boys home again, and complimented them upon the splendid manner in which they had conducted themselves during the campaign in South Africa.

The soldiers returning were Hurdis L. McLean, W. J. Proud, D. R. Kennedy, W. H. Harris, Marcellus Macdonald, W. J. Coombs and Robert Cameron. George Arbutick stopped over at New Glasgow, and Robert Horne at Pictou. They will be home next trip of the Minto. W. J. Proud slipped while coming out of one of the Halifax hotels and sustained a fracture of the wrist.

To-night the returned soldiers will be entertained at dinner at the Revere Hotel.

Captain Weeks and Pte. Brown are reported to be on their way home from Africa.
