Ivan's Breadbox Supplies Of Interest To Canadians

MONTREAL (CP)—The question of what's in Ivan's breadbox should concern Canadians as much as it, presumably, does the Russians. The national industrial conference board said Thursday the extent of Canada's food and wheat sales to the Soviet Union hinges largely on a new embargo in Russia on increasing needs, and population growth. Because of the increasing "internal needs," Russia would conceivably be forced to ship less wheat than in the past. These iron curtain countries, the board said, would be forced to turn increasingly to Canada to fill their wheat requirements. This was the gist of an analysis of the future Canada-Russia trade made by the board, a United States-based, independent institution for business and industry. The report was compiled by the board's Montreal branch office, and released here.

LONDON (AP)—Police identified a tattooed nude body found in a swank Kensington neighborhood as a 23-year-old prostitute who figured prominently in Britain's Profumo scandal. She was Margaret McGowan, who went under the name of Frances Brown when she testified for the defence in the trial of osteopath Stephen Ward last year.

RIPLEY'S BELIEVE IT OR NOT

Russia's crop 1963 wheat crop, struck by a unusually winter and dry, hot summer, forced smaller iron curtain countries to cover some of their requirements with Canadian wheat. Poland, Czechoslovakia, Bulgaria, East Germany and Hungary agreed to purchase more than 130,000 bushels of Canadian wheat for shipment over a three-year period. Purchases by Russia accounted for 49 per cent of all wheat shipments to Soviet during the 1963-64 crop year which runs from Aug. 1 to July 31, 1964.
