CONGRATULATIONS TO ERNIE O'BRIEN, manager of the Moncton Raceway, who took over the property early this season and has brought back the popularity of harness racing as shown by the tremendous crowd that witnessed last Wednesday night's \$2,000 Monctonian and other races.

It was one of the finest contests ever held over the oval, and owners Rankine MacLaine of Charlottetown and William MacDonald of Summerside must feel very proud, indeed, that their pacer, Mighty Lee, driven by George Callbeck of Summerside, won in 2:05 3-5, which is only one and two-fifths seconds slower than his record, taken over what was considered a very fast track.

And we are also pleased to congratulate Roy Creamer, a very gentlemanly driver, who piloted the hero of many contests, Walter Rosecroft 2:05 1-5, to a win and the placing, which gave him the first placing in the summary of the event. We have gone carefully over the supporting card, and we found it an excellent one.

ISLANDERS AT HALIFAX While a large crowd of New Brunswick race fans, aided by many from P. E. I., were crowded on the Moncton Raceway, Sackville Downs also put on a great show, with the five-year-old trotting mare, Selley Volstead, owned by Ray MacCallum of Marshfield, P.E.I., and driven by James (Roch) MacGregor placing first in races 1 and 4. Waystamp (Ratchford) 2-2, Downtown (J. Bernard) 3-5, times 2:10 4-5 and 2:09 4-5 - the latter a new record for Selley and the second fastest mile trotted in the Maritimes this season. The fastest mile trotted so far was at Charlottetown last Tuesday night when Lady Lalobura won in 2:09.

Another Island-owned horse added to the fireworks when Royal Onyx, owned and driven by James MacGregor, won his third and seventh dashes in 2:10 (a new record) and 2:09 4-5 (another new record). Becky's Prince (D. Ratchford) 2-4, Crystal Maid (G. Mauger) 4-2, Denny Pointer (J. Daniels) 3-4.

Among the other winners was Mr. Carroll, driven by Junior Chappell, with Joppa Maid (E. Shaw) 3, Royal Budlong (H. Yorkie) 3, time 2:17 1-5; Mr. Carroll is owned by Stanley Mayhew, Kinkora, P.E.I. Driver Chappell also won race 5 with First Again, owned by Stanley Mayhew of Kinkora, Jolity George (H. Walsh) 2, time 2:14 4-5. You will note from the above that P. E. 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WORLD'S BEST TO COMPETE

U.S., Russia Clash Today In Track And Field Meet

By TED SMITS PHILADELPHIA (AP) - The United States and Russia clash today in a dual meet that brings together most of the world's best men and women in track and field. America is favored to win in the men's events and Russia in the women's in the two day competition which, with good weather should draw 40,000 both days to Franklin Field. The forecast for the weekend is good. Rain has fallen off and on most of the week but stopped Friday. The powerful Russian team includes such stars as Igor Kashkarov, who has high jumped 7 feet 3/4 inch; Vasily Kuznetsov, who has bettered the world record in the decathlon; and Igor Ter-ovanesyan, a 26-foot broad jumper. The United States is counting on veteran ace Harold Connolly in the hammer, Al Oester in the discus, Greg Bell in the broad jump, and Parry O'Brien in the shot - all Olympic champions - together with such sensational youngsters as Ray Norton in the sprint, Tom Murphy in the 800, and Al Cantello, who recently threw the javelin 282 3/4 to better the world record.

Dodgers Notch First Victory

The Dodgers have finally broken the ice, winning their first ball game in the City Softball League. They did it in fine style too, whipping the B.I.S. Shamrocks 13-6. Keith Dalziel went the route for the winners, scattering six hits, walking five and fanning one. Dalziel was pitching two-hit ball going into the bottom of the fifth with the score reading 10-1 for Dodgers. The Irish drove 8 runs across the plate in this frame, tagging Dalziel for four hits, including a double by Wally Shepherd and a triple by Merrill Longaphie. Ev. Beagan's crew was held hitless from there on however. Coach Ev. Beagan started on the mound for the Irish, being relieved half-way through the top of the fifth inning by Lorne McGuigan, centrefielder for the Shamrock club. Beagan, up to that time, had been tagged for ten hits, having walked five and fanned one. McGuigan was touched for three hits, and walked three. The Hennessy-coached Dodgers scored two runs in the opening frame, 3 in the second, 2 in the fourth, 3 in the fifth, 2 in the sixth and one in the seventh. Top man of the game at the plate was Harold 'Doc' Hennessy with a 2 for 3 average with a double and a single. Merrill Longaphie, first sacker for the Irish, hit two triples in four times up to drive in three of the Shamrocks' six runs. Calling the balls and strikes last evening was Ivan 'Fats' Connors with Des Burge handling the bases. Today it is Shamrocks at Dodgers and Juniors at Barry's in a twin bill at the Old Diamond.

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Hockey's Hall Of Famers To Be Honored At Toronto

By JACK SULLIVAN Canadian Press Staff Writer - If you want to hear some tall hockey stories, prepare to be in Toronto on Saturday, Sept. 15. That day, more than 20 of hockey's all-time great players who made the headlines over a 50-year period dating from the 1890s to the 1940s, are scheduled to be in Toronto. Old age and inability to get around may keep some of the 30 or so guests at home, but there should be enough around to make it a historic occasion. The idea is to honor all the living members of hockey's Hall of Fame. Another reason for the get-together is to let people know that a permanent building to house pictures and some of the equipment of old-timers will be set up in the Canadian National Exhibition grounds. The old codgers will have a lot to reminisce about. They recall the "good old days" of seven-man teams when the extra man was known as the rover. There'll be talk of the days when there were no goal nets, just a couple of poles placed on the ice, and when there was no artificial ice and the brawny fellows played in outdoor rinks in temperatures that would send modern-day folks to the comfort of their living rooms. This will be their day of glory, the first time since the shrine came into being nearly 17 years ago that an effort has been made to get all the old-time greats together. They will represent most of the storied old teams that were formed before a bearded old gentleman, Lord Stanley, donated the Stanley Cup in 1893. That was before the Davis Cup or even the long-forgotten Temple Cup, which is baseball's World Series trophy, were thought about. Among the invited guests for instance, are Danny Bain of Winnipeg, a star on the old Winnipeg Victorias team that won the Cup in 1896, and 81-year-old Dickie Boon of Montreal who captained the "little men of iron" - the Montreal AAA team that won the Cup in 1902. Then there are Frank (Cyclone) Taylor from Vancouver and

Newsy Lalonde from Montreal, who played on the Ottawa Silver Sevens and Renfrew Millionaires teams, among other clubs that rode high in pre-First World War years. Paddy Moran is another great expected to be on hand. He played goal for Quebec Bulldogs more than 30 years ago. From the West, in addition to Bain, will be Ernie (Moose) Johnson, a native of Montreal and a colorful defenceman with Montreal and Pacific Coast teams from 1906 to 1922; Duke Keats and Eester Patrick from Victoria, B.C.; Frank Fredrickson from Vancouver; Red Dutton from Calgary, a comparative newcomer and a wild defenceman from the old Montreal Maroons and New York Americans. From Toronto there will be Hugh Lehman, one of the great goalkeepers of his day in the early 1900s. Probably the best known is Joe Malone of Old Quebec Bulldog fame who scored 44 goals in a 22-game schedule in the 1917-18 season. Executives and builders of the game who have been elected to the Hall of Fame also are expected to be on hand. They include Conn Smythe and Billy Hewitt of Toronto; Bill Northey and Senator Donat Raymond of Montreal; Claude Robinson and Frank Patrick of Vancouver; Al Pickard of Regina; Lloyd Turner of Calgary and George Dudley of Midland, Ont. You can bet that the players will attract most of the attention.

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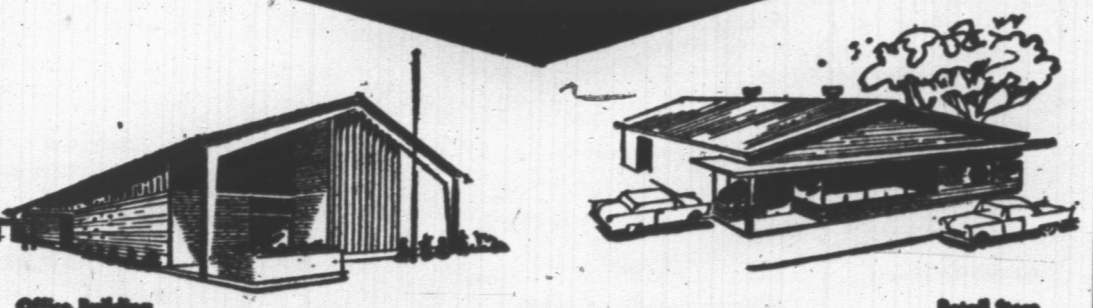
SCHOLARSHIPS AND BURSARIES

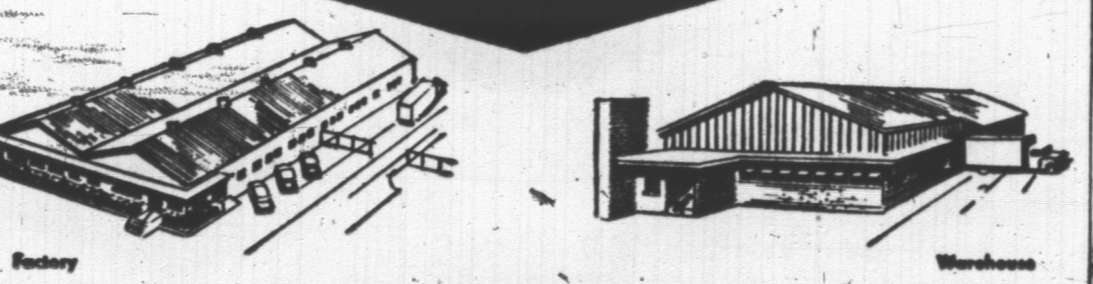
OPENING OF FALL TERM
