

# New York Wins To Open 2-Game Lead Over Cleveland

New York Yankees opened up a fat two-game bulge over Cleveland Indians in the torrid American League pennant race Sunday when they edged Boston Red Sox 3-2 while the Tribe took a 10-3 scalping from Detroit Tigers.

The results left the magic number for the Yanks five—meaning any combination of five New York victories and Cleveland defeats will send Casey Stengel's operation into the world series for the sixth time in seven years.

Chicago White Sox, the only other team with a mathematical chance of winning the pennant, dropped an 8-1 decision to the sixth-place Kansas City As. That all but eliminated the White Sox, who now are five games off the pace.

Both the Yanks and Indians have all their remaining games on the road—seven for the New Yorkers and five for the Tribe. Here is how the top of the race looks going into the final week:

**GRIM SLAMS DOOR**

Bob Grim was the big man in the Yank triumph over the Red Sox. He replaced Bob Turley on the mound with two runs in, no one out and two runners on base in the third inning and slammed the door in the faces of the Red Sox.

For seven innings, he didn't allow a hit, facing only 22 men. The only batters who got on base were Billy Klaus, who reached first on Billy Martin's bad throw, and Ted Williams, who walked.

Grim won 20 games, the best by a pitcher in the American League since 1908. He has been bothered by arm trouble most of this year. The Yanks gave Turley a two-

run advantage, but he couldn't hold it, and when Jackie Jensen poked a home run with Williams on base in the third, Grim got a hurry call.

The Yanks produced the winning run in the fifth off Willard Nixon, an old nemesis, who had beaten them four times this year—and they did it the hard way. Gerry Coleman opened with a single to right. Grim popped out on an attempted bunt, but Hank Bauer scratched a single off Nixon's glove after Ted Lepcio dropped his foul. Irv Noren walked filling the bases and Coleman scored on McDougald's roller.

**MILLER TRIPS INDIANS**  
The defeat of the Indians was ironic, indeed, for it came at the hands of 20-year-old Bob Miller, who was beaten by the Yanks last week. At that time, there was considerable comment at the thought of Tiger manager, Buckey Harris, using an untested youngster in so important a game.

Harris said, however, that he planned to see Miller against the Tribe, too, and that he did. The young lefthander held the Indians to six hits before retiring after seven innings. He wasn't knocked out of the box, either. He was merely tired. The only time Al Lopez' crew was able to score when pinch hitter Hank Foiles hit a home run, following a walk to Larry Doby.

The defeat was the Indians' fourth in a row and equalled their longest losing streak of the season. The Tigers' blazing bats pounded Mike Garcia and Ray Narleski during a six-run sixth inning. Everyone in the Detroit starting lineup except Ray Boone hit safely.

The White Sox, who have blown six high in the September, scored their one run in the second inning, but soon saw it dissipated when

Gus Zernial hit a bases-loaded home run in the third. That was all Art Ditmar needed. Chicago ace Dick Donovan was the loser.

The crowd of 31,034 at the final game of the year brought the total attendance to 1,393,054 compared to the 304,666 the As drew last year in Philadelphia.

In the only other American League game, Baltimore Orioles pulled into a seventh place tie with Washington Senators by whipping the Nats 9-0 behind Jim Wilson.

**BATTLE FOR THIRD**  
Shooting in a very strong wind, O.Cdt. R. Hambly won the United Services Officers Match for the second year in succession on Saturday at the Squaw Point Rifle Range. Sgt. Roy Vessey was second with Lieut. A. K. Mutch third.

# Paul Jay Hurls Two, Wins Both As Dodgers Cop Title

Strong-armed righthander Paul Jay pitched 19 innings of masterful 7-hit baseball for the Dodgers yesterday at Memorial Field and drove home the game-winning and city league title winning run in the last half of the tenth inning in the second game with a 350 foot double as the Dodgers swept both ends of a doubleheader from the Flyers 6-0 and 2-1.

Jay, a surprise starter in the second game after setting down the Flyers on 5 hits in the opener, was even better the second time out as he limited the Flyers to only 2 hits, a single to Jack Kane in the first

and a double to Bernie Gallant in the sixth.  
Paul's usually sharp control was almost unsharp yesterday and over the 19 innings not one Flyer got to first on a free pass.

**FIRST GAME**  
Donnie MacLean on the hill for the Flyers in the opener matched Jay's 5-hit effort with a neat 4-hit job of his own but 5 walks and a disastrous outfield error led to his downfall.  
Only 2 of the Dodgers 6 runs were earned and 4 counters came home in the top of the fourth. Mc-

Callum started the fourth with a walk, went to third on a sacrifice and an infield out and raced home on LeClair's bloop single. MacLean passed Ryan and Squarebriggs to load the sacks and Paul Jay unloaded a tremendous drive into centerfield that Burke got his glove on but couldn't hold and three more runs came scampering in.

The Dodgers added two more in the seventh to put the lid on it. Ken MacDonald hit a double for the Dodgers while teammates LeClair, Ryan and Jay got singles.

## Big Crowd Expected For Marciano-Moore Encounter

NEW YORK (AP)—For the first time since the days of Joe Louis, there is a "big fight" tang in the air as Rocky Marciano prepares to defend his heavyweight title against Archie Moore Tuesday night in Yankee Stadium.

Although Marciano, unbeaten in 46 fights, remains a 3-to-1 favorite to whip the challenger, all signs point to a roaring crowd of 50,000 and a gate of more than \$750,000 for the 15-round match.

The publicity campaign for Moore, followed by his victory over Cuba's Nino Valdes and his knockout of Bobo Olson in three rounds, has cast the 38-year-old ring gypsy in the role of a martyr.

Encouraged by the delaying tactics of Al Weill, the champion's manager, people began to believe that Marciano was ducking Moore. A Marciano-Moore match became a "must."

Not since Louis fought his return match with Jersey Joe Walcott or his second bout with Billy Conn has there been such tremendous interest in a heavyweight match. The International Boxing Club reports an advance sale of \$500,000 at \$40 tops.

**NO HOME TELEVISION**  
In addition to the natural appeal of a match between the 31-year-old champion from Brockton, Mass. and the older, more experienced light-heavyweight king, the sale has been boosted by the fact there will be no home television.

But it will be broadcast in the U. S. and in Canada over the CBC Dominion network at 11:30 p. m. A.D.T.

Theatre television really comes of age for this bout with 128 theatres in 92 cities including Toronto piping the picture to their audiences over a closed circuit TV. As the average fee is about \$3.50 and 350,000 are expected, theatre owners will gross \$1,000,000.

Roughly speaking the promoters and fighters get a total of about \$1 per head to be divided 40 per cent to Marciano, 20 per cent to Moore and 40 per cent to the promoters.

On the basis of the 40-20 per cent split, which also holds good for the regular gate receipts, Marciano should drag down about \$400,000 and Moore about \$200,000 for the night's work.

**DEMPSEY-TUNNEY RECORD**  
The all-time record for a fight was the \$2,658,660 for the Gene Tunney-Jack Dempsey rematch at Chicago, Sept. 22, 1927. The best since was the \$1,925,564 for the second Louis-Conn bout in 1946 at \$100 tops.

In 48 fights Marciano has won every one, 42 by knockouts. He has been down only once, in the first round of his first scrap with Walcott. Moore has a 120-19-5 record for 144 bouts dating back to 1936. He has knocked out 82 opponents and has been stopped four times—by Jimmy Bivins, Eddie Booker, Ezzard Charles and Leonard Morrow.

Those who like Marciano point to the fact that Moore never was able to beat Charles in three starts and was knocked out once. However, that was years ago when Charles was better than he was last year losing twice to Marciano.

On the same line of reasoning, Moore should have been better than, too.
