

# Montague Shades B.Y.C. In Free Scoring Tussle

Montague Primroses took a firm grip on the fourth and last playoff position in the Island Hockey League last night at the Sports Arena by outlasting Basileca Youth Club 12-10 in a free-wheeling long, fixture.

The Primroses ran off to a 3-0 lead in the first period but saw the youth club, with shifty Buck Whitlock playing his first game in an Island League uniform leading the way, ram home 7 straight goals by the 11.15 mark of the second period to take a 7-3 lead. Montague staged a rally that netted three goals to tie things up at 7-7 in the last nine minutes and trailed 8-6 at the end of the second.

# Rowing Win, Hockey Loss Are High And Low Points

TORONTO (CP)—The successes and setbacks of their athletes thousands of miles from home touched Canadians most during the crowded 1956 sports year.

A Canadian Press poll shows starting victory for orsmen and marksmen in Australia and stunning defeat for hockey players in Italy marked the high and low points of the sports barometer this year.

The Grey Cup football final shared honors as the most gripping event.

Canadian sports editors and sportscasters, voting in the CP's ranked Canada's Olympic medal-22nd annual year - end survey, winning performances and the annual East-West football classic as the most thrilling events of the year.

The UBC eight's added a silver medal to the Canadian collection, finishing second behind the powerful U.S. crew and ahead of Australian and Sweden.

Ouellette, a tool designer, posted a perfect record 600 score to pick up the second gold award in small-bore rifle shooting, using a rifle borrowed from team captain Boa, who was third with using a rifle borrowed from team captain Boa, who was third with 598 points.

The selectors split up their votes for the Grey Cup on certain facets of the game, such as the appearance of Don Getty, 22, of London, Ont., as Edmonton quarterback, first Canadian to start at that position since 1947, and the performance of Edmonton's Jackie Parker, who scored a record 19 points on three touchdowns and a single.

Canada's 2-0 defeat by Russia at Cortina, Italy in February wound up an eight-year reign as Olympic hockey champions and left many stunned by reversal in what was regarded as Canada's own game.

Perhaps even more disappointing was the 4-1 setback suffered by Kitchener-Waterloo Dutchmen, 1955 Allan Cup champions, at the hands of the unheralded U. S. team. The result was declared one of the greatest upsets in Olympic hockey history.

There was ironic triumph for UBC's four - without - crosswain crew in their Olympic win. The four, Don Arnold, Kelowna, B.C., Walter D'Hondt, Lorne Loomer and Archie MacKinnon, all of Vancouver, had been turned down for the eight-man crew at the beginning of the season but stuck together.

# Red Wings Dump Bruins 5-3 To Take Over League Lead

BOSTON (AP)—Detroit Red Wings dumped Boston Bruins 5-3 Thursday night to take over first place in the National Hockey League.

A capacity crowd of 13,909 saw the Bruins fall off the top NHL rung for the first time since Nov. 8 as Marcel Pronovost and Johnny Bucyk scored a goal each for the Wings, an assist each for the league's leading goal getter, added two assists. Detroit was in front 2-1 as the final period opened but Alex Delvecchio and Bucyk beat Boston's string goalie Terry Sawchuk with shots from the left side to put the Wings ahead 4-1. Sawchuk was playing his first game in two weeks after being in hospital with blood disease.

Don McKenney, Bruin centre who was in on all the Boston scoring with two goals and an assist, tallied at 10:51 and Fernie Flaman followed less than a minute later.

To wrap it up the Wing's pounce got the jump on defenseman Flaman and fired home a 15 footer at 14:06.
