

Pearson Warns West To Keep Its Guard Up

NEW YORK, (CP) — Canada's L. B. Pearson says the West should keep its guard up but should not miss a chance to help ease world tension.

The Canadian external affairs minister said Wednesday it would be folly to weaken defensive arrangements now operating in the West.

But it would be "equally foolish not to seize any and every real chance to relax the tension... however slight and however temporary that relaxation might be."

Pearson, president of the current session of the United Nations general assembly, spoke on "national freedom and international co-operation" in one of a series of annual lectures at Town Hall to promote a better understanding among English-speaking peoples.

He said NATO now is apparently to be put to the test of "peaceful handshakes and disarming gestures" from Russia. The countries of the free world must consider now what their policy should be.

Calling for firmness and vigilance, Pearson said fear of Russia was one of the "chief ingredients" which brought about the formation of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

"Something more than fear will have to keep it going," Pearson said.

OTTAWA, (CP)—A New Brunswick mutual insurance company Wednesday won its case in an appeal before the Supreme Court of Canada on a six-year-old income tax assessment by the federal revenue department.

The court, reversing an Exchequer Court judgment, ruled that the Stanley Mutual Fire Insurance Co., of Stanley, N. B., is not liable on the \$1,914 income tax assessment levied against the company's 1947 surplus of \$6,103 earned in 1947.

Report British Flowers Arrive In Good Condition

OTTAWA, (CP)—An experimental shipment of 108 bunches of flowers from Devon and Cornwall in Britain—half of them dipped in wax—has arrived here in "remarkably good condition."

Dr. W. F. Darke, agricultural adviser to the United Kingdom high commissioner's office, said the anemones, similar to buttercups and daisies grown in Canada, arrived here Friday night in remarkably good condition.

"There was no apparent difference in those dipped in wax and the remainder," he said, "but a close watch is being kept on which last the longest under normal home conditions in Canada."
