Vehicular Check Urged By RCMP

In another strong effort to help prevent 'avoidable' fatalities, the RCMP have enlisted the co-operation of every garage owner and service station operator in the province.

They are asking the people who look after and repair motor vehicles to make a special check of each one that comes to them, to be sure they are in good working order. Particularly, they are being asked to check exhaust systems to prevent deaths due to asphyxiation.

LETTER SENT

The letter which Inspector A. S. McNeil, officer commanding, has sent out reads in part as follows:

"During the past few years,

and already this year, a number of people in our province were killed in their automobiles from asphyxiation due to faulty exhaust systems. Also each year, a number of bad accidents are caused by faulty equipment such as head, rear, parking and turn-lights, poor brakes, worn out tires, etc. We are asking your support to assist us in reducing this type of accident."

The service men are being asked to tell their staff to check every vehicle for such things.

One of the reasons for the action is that it has been noticed in the past a great majority of car operators are truly grateful to service men for pointing out something potentially dangerous.

Dr. J.C. Sinnott Addresses Island Underwriters Ass'n

At the monthly luncheon meeting of the Life Underwriters Association of Prince Edward Island, held at the Charlottetown Hotel Friday, Dr. J. C. Sinnott of Charlottetown was the special speaker.

In the course of Dr. Sinnott's brilliant career, he was for several years on the medical board of one of the world's largest life insurance companies with office in Montreal. In this capacity he had the joint responsibility of accepting or rejecting thousands of applications for life insurance.

Dr. Sinnott related a wide variety of cases and the factors which made them unsatisfactory risks in the eyes of the companies. He referred to the progress made in recent years in assessing life insurance applications and pointed out that, now, many persons with a history of tuberculosis, cancer, diabetes, heart disease, may

quality for life insurance with certain limitations. Dr. Sinnott answered numerous questions as to the reasons why certain applications were deferred, rated or declined.
