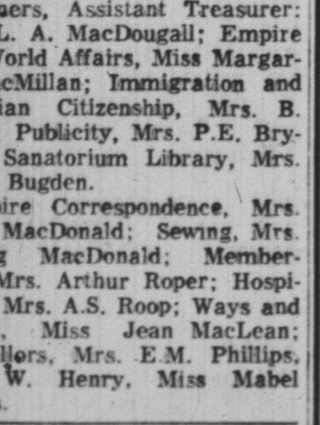
Best for Baby's Coughs

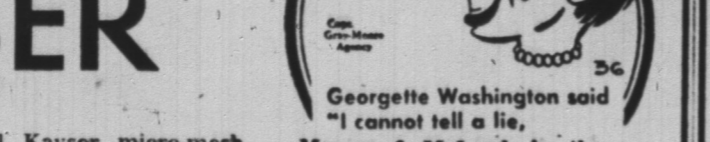

I don't want to pursue such a woman, and really feel embarrassed every time I meet her. My first impulse is to ignore and not speak to her; but my upbringing won't let me do this. The minutes of the January meeting were read, approved and signed. A bill of 90 cents was vol-

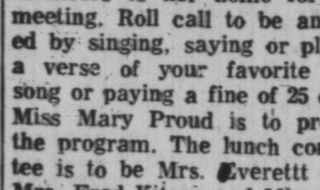
HOUSEHOLD HINT

Supper delight: SALMON CHEESE BRAID

Break up with a fork 1 can (7 oz.) salmon Sprinkle with 1/4 tsp. pepper 1/4 tsp. celery salt 3/4 c. shredded process cheese 1 tsp. finely-chopped onion 1/2 c. finely-chopped celery 2 tbsps. chopped parsley

Mix in 1/4 c. condensed mushroom soup Sift into bowl 1 1/2 c. once-sifted all-purpose flour or 2 c. once-sifted pastry flour 4 tsp. Magic Baking Powder 1/2 tsp. salt Cut in finely 1/2 c. chilled shortening Make a well in dry ingredients; mix in 3/4 c. milk

Add more milk, if necessary to make a soft dough. Turn out on floured board, knead 10 secs. Roll into a 9 x 12" rectangle. Spread centre third lengthwise with salmon filling. Make 11 slashes 1" apart, in each side of dough, cut from filling to outside edge. Fold strips at an angle across filling, alternate one side, then the other.
