JOHN H.W. PIDGON

Western Europe Split into Two Camps By Red Propaganda

LONDON (Reuters) — Russia's new proposals for East-West talks to allow international tension split Western Europe into opposing camps today.

In Bonn, authoritative sources said the West German government would take a dim view of new talks. But in Britain newspapers on both sides of the political fence called for new negotiations.

After all, asked the right-wing London Sunday Express, "what is there in London?"

As outlined Saturday by Soviet Party secretary Nikita Khrushchev and Premier Nikolai S. Khrushchev in the Supreme Soviet, the Soviet proposals call for "West negotiations" during war, "recognize the status quo," and effect world disarmament.

The foreign office in London said it is awaiting receipt of the text of the proposals before commenting.

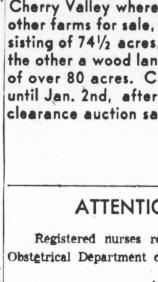

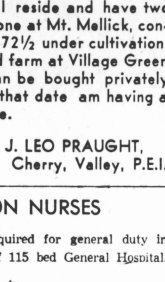

Accurate Missile Is Main Business US Senate Told

WASHINGTON (AP) — Garrison Norton, assistant secretary of the navy, told Senate investigators Monday "our No. 1 business is to get a missile with a warhead which can land on targets." "Nothing should dilute that," he said. "We are very close to getting it."

Norton appeared before a Senate subcommittee on Tuesday to discuss the accuracy of the Vanguard earth satellite test in secret but was overruled by Murray Snyder, assistant secretary of defense for public affairs.

SNYDER IS SILENT
There was no immediate comment from Snyder. The Vanguard test Dec. 6 was a failure. Some members of Congress have complained it was surrounded with too much publicity and consequently cost the United States considerable prestige.

Norton told the senators he was not surprised by the failure. He said he argued that all missile work, including the Vanguard project, "should be done in private."

"I said it was against the safety of the nation to be done in public," he testified. "I thought there was a great likelihood it would fail. We had had three previous successes." Asked to amplify his statement Norton said all three stages of the launching rocket had been tested successfully previous. He said the law of averages was such that a failure was about due. Norton said he agreed with Trevor Gardner, former assistant secretary of the air force, that the defense department's missile organization was an inefficient "mess."

EFFORT WAS LACKING
"I personally feel," Norton said, "that the kind of effort we needed on missiles, based on the hard intelligence we had received, was not put into it."

Norton complained naval research has suffered from the dollar straitjacket in which we must operate.

He said "I scream like a wounded wolf" when funds are taken from research to keep within the budget.

At the same time he said he did not have to consider the same factors that the president must — the state of the economy, the tax picture and so on.

Scientific Research To Get More From Soviet Budget

MOSCOW (AP) — Finance Minister Zverev told the Soviet parliament Thursday the U.S.S.R. will spend a total of 18,000,000,000 rubles in 1958 on scientific research.

Zverev also told the Supreme Soviet 1958 will see a research spending will increase by 1,800,000,000 rubles — or 450,000,000 per cent over 1957.

Zverev announced that 1958 appropriations for the ministry of science are scheduled at 9,800,000,000 rubles — \$2,075,000,000. This compares with \$6,700,000,000 in 1957. The increase is appropriated by the Supreme Soviet for 1957.

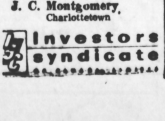

MOSCOW (AP) — Finance Minister Zverev told the Soviet parliament Thursday the U.S.S.R. will spend a total of 18,000,000,000 rubles in 1958 on scientific research.
