**Odd and Curious Facts**

Have you ever noticed at the top of certain newspapers, near the date line, a star or number of stars? These stars indicate how recently the paper has come off the press. The first papers printed usually omit the star. In larger cities, where extra editions are printed with "hot" news, a star is placed near the date line to show that it is the 2nd edition. This 2nd edition will have two stars, a third three stars and so on until the final edition has been issued.

To determine the age of any tree, just count the number of rings across the stump after the tree has been felled. Each ring corresponds to a year.

There is no truth in the old tale that some creatures never sleep. Every creature in the world requires a rest period, but some, such as snakes and fishes, sleep with their eyes open. This is because they have no proper eyelids which they can close.

African elephants are said to develop the largest tusks known. In a museum in England, visitors are shown a pair that tip the scales at 228 pounds. Besides being heavy, elephant tusks have been known to reach a length of 11 feet 11 inches, or about twice the height of a tall man.

A variety of palm tree that grows in South America produces nuts that are made into buttons. Commercially they are known as vegetable ivory buttons because they are derived from a plant and because they resemble ivory—in their natural state. These buttons are often used on men's and ladies' tailored clothing.

That cork that popped from your wine bottle recently came from the cork oak tree which grows in Spain, Portugal, Algeria, Italy, France and other places along the Mediterranean sea. No matter how often the trees are jarred, they keep on growing and producing in finer grade of cork at each peeling, which takes place every eight or ten years. In recent years, those trees have been introduced to California where they seem to be thriving well.
