

Commission On Taxation No Cure-All For Problems

Commission on Taxation to make Canada a land of happy taxpayers is a goal that must be pursued for all time to come, says the Canadian Tax Foundation.

The Foundation, an article in its Canadian Tax Journal, says it would also be unrealistic to expect the Commission to come up with solutions that by themselves will solve Canada's problems of economic growth and unemployment.

"The difficult part of the Commission's task will be to pinpoint with a reasonable degree of certainty the real effects of our present tax structure."

It adds that while it is important to try to discover the real effect of taxation on an individual's behaviour "which is probably as varied as the patterns of snowflakes" even more important is the real effect of taxation on the decisions made in the business and financial world.

"And this is where business can indeed play an important part in the success of the Commission."

The Foundation says that if businessmen could give examples of cases where corporate taxation had the effect of postponing or ruling out certain investment plans "then this evidence, translated into lost job opportunities, would be worth as much as or more than all the exercises in logic, general arguments, and tax research put together."

However, the Foundation says it will be extremely difficult to isolate the tax factor from all the other factors that go toward making a decision about a possible new venture.

If the tax factor can be isolated and it can be illustrated that a five-per-cent, 10-per-cent, 15-per-cent, or even greater difference in the corporate tax rate would have permitted the project to proceed, then the Commission will have some real evidence to get its teeth into."

Another vitally important area where the business community alone is in a position to give expert testimony is in connection with tax incentives.

"The words 'tax incentive' have a nice wholesome sound, but so far the business community has failed to define with sufficient precision just what it means by them."

"The unanswered questions about the theory and practice of tax incentives are many, and a search for these answers may well take up a good part of the Commission's time."

Obviously, says the Founda-

tion, the only people who can venture worthwhile answers to some or all the questions about tax incentives are those people at whom they are directed.

"Many economists and busi-

U.S. Gov't Plans Aluminum Sale

WASHINGTON (CP) — The U.S. government plans to dispose of surplus aluminum from the national defence stockpile at market prices but has agreed to hold public hearings before carrying out the plan, the commerce department announced today.

From other sources it was learned Canadian officials have been consulted by U.S. authorities and have expressed concern that the proposed sale may disrupt commercial markets and prices. Canada is a major aluminum exporter.
