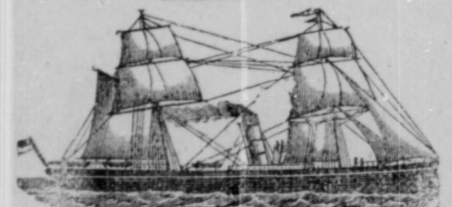

Of Special Interest to our Farmers

Back to First Principles.

Farmers who have been following new ideas and adopting the so-called improved methods with the feeling that the world was all moving along together and away from former practices are occasionally to stop and lean on the fence and mentally admit that their fathers did know something after all. Such cases occur when some plain, scientific reason is given for an old custom which has been cast aside as out of date. In our own case one striking instance is in the realization of the importance of pressing the soil down over the seed. To a boy who was keeping one eye on the number of acres yet to be planted (and all covered with hand hoes) and both ears intent on the dinner call, it seemed a waste of time to stop and put the stamp of the hoe on every hill that was covered; but it was insisted on and orders obeyed. Later experiments, have shown that firming the soil about the seeds or roots is the most important part of the work of planting or transplanting, provided the soil is in proper condition previously.

It is not likely that we will go back to the custom of letting colts run in open sheds and lie in their own filth until their sides are coated and checked off by racks where their bodies have to bend like the skin of an alligator, for the purpose of 'toughening' them, but there will be less effort made to exclude cold air when the pure article cannot be provided in any other condition. On this subject the Practical Farmer expresses ideas which are worth considering by our dairy-men.

The great trouble that has been experienced of late years from tuberculosis in cattle North leads us to ask whether the practice of close housing of cattle in artificially-heated quarters with warmed water has not had a great deal to do with the constitutional weakness that invites disease. Then, too, the crowding of animals into close quarters in winter, with little or no fresh air, certainly tends to the spread of disease from infected animals. Are we not in danger of going too far in this matter of protection? We are continually told that it is cheaper to keep cattle warm with pine boards than with feed. But in the raising of young cattle may not even this be a disadvantage? We all know that the capacity of the milchcow to produce milk comes from her capacity to consume food, and when we are raising a young animal we want it to get a large capacity to consume food preparatory to its making use of this capacity for the production of milk and butter from the food consumed. Now, if a young animal is closely housed is there not danger that its appetite may be made delicate, and that it may not develop the paunch that the Scotchman always wants to develop in his Ayrshire by making the young animal live on the coarsest fare, so that having to consume a great deal it may get the great paunch capacity. We really are beginning to think that in many cases the housing and protection of cattle is being carried to too great an extent for the stamin of the race, and that it may pay during the young life of an animal to expose it rather more and thus compel it to eat more. A well fed animal will withstand a great deal of cold, and if kept dry by shelter from rain and sleet storms may be better off than if closely housed. The calf that has plenty to eat and only an open shed for shelter, is usually free from lice, which are the bane of the housed calves, and the fact such a calf is compelled to eat more to keep up the animal heat is really of great advantage in its future development by giving it an appetite and capacity for the consumption of food. Cows for the dairy are really to be considered machines for the transformation of food into dairy products and the cow that can do the most of this is the best cow for the dairyman. If then the calf is coddled and needs but little food to keep up animal heat, is there not really danger that it may develop into a delicate animal that cannot digest enough for the best results in the dairy. We are not advocating cruelty to animals, but we do think that in many instances the stamina of our herds is being seriously injured by the coddling process. We kept a herd of cows once whose milking stable was merely slatted on the east side so that the winter sun shone in, and whose dairy quarters when not a field was a long shed surrounding the barn yard, where they had all the hay they chose to eat at all times. We never had trouble of any kind with these cows and always got as high a return for our food as we see recorded in the results of those who stable closely. They were protected from cold winds but had at all times the free pure air, and plenty to and drink and we have never seen a closely stabled herd that did any better either in health of animals or product.
