Chinese View
Prospect Of New
Japan With Dread

HONG KONG, Feb. 14 — (AP) —
Chinese Communists are devoting
a heavy share of their propa-
ganda to protests against the pro-
posed Japanese peace treaty,
which they call a new "American
plot."

To many serious-minded Chin-
ese moderates, especially among
commercial people, approach of
the peace treaty with Japan
stands as evidence of a national
failure by China.

At the end of the Japanese
war, it was the hope and ex-
pectation of the Allies that Japan
would be replaced by China as
the leading power in Asia.

The Allies, excepting Russia,
stood ready to help with hard
cash to make China a sort of
stabilising factor in Asia. But
China didn't do the ready-made
robe.

Chinese practicalists do not
view China's present trend as one
that will lead to anything but war
and more misery. They say that
the approaching peace treaty
negotiations stand as a reminder
of lost opportunity, and some of
them interpret the Red propa-
ganda as a hint that the Reds
to some extent feel the same
way.

Anyway, it is clear that most of
the Allies of 1945 are about
ready to accept Japan again as
the eastern leader.

Chinese both in and out of
China look upon resurgent Japan
with dread. But the non-Com-
munists among them see no other
way out. They only hope that this

General Assembly
To Decide Issue Of
Church Card-Playing

MONTREAL, Feb. 14 — (CP) —
Montreal's Presbyterian Presbytery
has tossed its controversial card-
playing issue into the lap of the
church's highest court, the general
assembly.

First brought up as a topic of
discussion last June, the question
before the Presbytery for the last
several months has been: "Is the
playing of cards in church property
a recreational activity morally
compatible with the teaching of
Christ and within the discretion of
the church session to permit?"

Previous debates on the subject
resulted in a division of opinion
as to whether a pronouncement
should be made. But at a meeting
last night the Presbytery voted to
ask the general assembly "to give
such guidance as will be useful for
the congregations of our church."

No mention was made of such
"recreations" as card-playing and
dancing in the resolution presented
by the committee on evangelism
and social action, but it did note
"a growing inclination on the part
of some to allow the use of church
buildings for purposes other than
those that seem spiritually related
to the church's special task."
