LONDON, ENGLAND.

In Dress Goods, greys of every tint and soft fawns take first place. In fact, light-colored goods are about the only thing shown by the best houses. Our ladies must be prepared to sink their prejudice for dark stuffs and go in for the nice light colors now shown, as they make up exceedingly becoming, and make us feel that winter is not with us the whole year round.

A novelty which I saw at the Bon Marche, Paris, was dress stuff embroidered all over, to be used for sleeves, and also for a narrow edge to the long basques now being so much worn. Sashes are giving place to long girales, which are got up very rich and look pretty. Velvet has quite superseded plush; the bon-ton dressmakers and milliners are not using plush at all.

In Paris it is thought tournures will shortly again be revived. High-shouldered sleeves and Medici collars are still considered distingue. Many dresses show fronts of pleated crepe.

The extreme style in Jackets is the long shape, but I do not consider they will be much of a favorite, the three-quarter length being much neater and more becoming. As to the color of Jackets, the same remarks apply as to Dress Goods. Light lawns, drabs, greys and tweeds are decidedly the correct thing. Our ladies have never yet moved up to this becoming style, viz, light-colored jackets. Light colors must be used this season if our ladies wish to dress in the present fashion.
