## Officials Urge Cancellation Of Ont. Spud Permit

Department of agriculture officials here have acted to

have a federal permit allowing Ontario importers to bring in table stock potatoes for seed reseeded.

Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae said today the permit would have allowed small table stock from this province to be used as seed in Ontario. "This type of use could produce a potato that might be detrimental to our industry," he said.

The minister said he called federal authorities and requested that the Ontario permit be cancelled.

He said, however, that some small table stock from this province is still going to Ontario "but it is for processing and will be watched carefully by federal fruit and vegetable personnel."

## Where Is Money Going? Queries Opposition Chief

Opposition Leader A.W. Matheson charged last night that the provincial government "seems to have more money for everything else but agriculture."

Pointing out that Premier Walter R. Shaw in a recent "report to the people" appeared to be worried about "the criticism of his government's financial policies," Mr. Matheson asked "why didn't he explain his policies?"

He said "in 1958, the revenues of this province were less than \$202,000,000. Today the revenues are about \$300,000,000. In 1958, after capital expenditures of about \$1,000,000 on rural electrification, industrial promotion and other smaller projects all charged directly against our revenues, we had a deficit of \$1,750,000."

### 20-Year-Old Dies In Hosp.

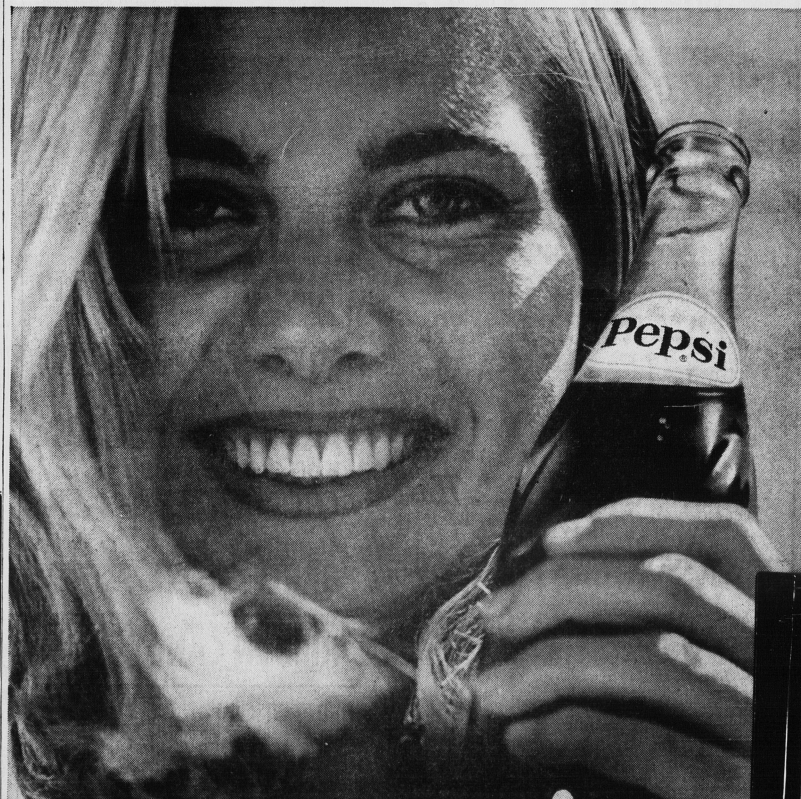
Russell Douglas Brazz of 272 Grafton Street, and formerly
