Battle Of Britain Will Be Commemorated This Sunday

Annual observance of Battle of the Atlantic Sunday, commemorating the services of the Royal Canadian Navy and Canada's Merchant Navy in the Second World War, will take place this year on Sunday, May 5. On that day, in naval establishments from coast to coast, in ships of the fleet and in numerous churches, special services and observances will be held and tribute will be paid to those who served and gave their lives at sea.
15 YEARS AGO
Battle of the Atlantic Sunday (this year falls almost 15 years to the day after Nazi U-boats first pressed the sea war up the St. Lawrence River and Canadian sailors fought and died within sight of the shores of their homeland.
U-boats struck in the St. Lawrence at a time when escort vessels could be spared only at great sacrifices from the North Atlantic convoy lanes.
The first attack occurred on the night of May 11-12, 1942. Off Cap des Rosiers on the Gaspé coast, The British freighter Nicoya and the Dutch freighter Leto were sunk. The survivors, wounded, shocked and coated with oil, landed on the hitherto peaceful shores of the St. Lawrence.
Later that summer, an enemy torpedo struck the surrounding district of that same Gaspé village as it ran on to the beach and exploded after missing its mark.
A hastily-organized convoy system was brought into force but Canada could provide only makeshift escorts. A few days after the sinkings, the inaugural convoy sailed from Sydney, Cape Breton Island, for Quebec City. A lone minesweeper, HMCS Drummondville, guarded a lone merchant ship.

Jack Campbell Brings B. C. Building Firms Under 1 Roof

Located adjacent to the Trans-Canada Highway, the building is ideally situated for easy access by business men, and having in mind Board of Directors meetings and staff meetings, Mr. Campbell remodelled the second floor into a large lounge designed to accommodate eighty people.
Besides the above meetings it can be used for sales meetings, sample room and merchandising display, receptions, and a meeting place for organizations and associations.
Mr. Campbell feels that his center fills an important place in the community, and from the response of those requesting quarters, it is justified. His enterprise is most commendable, and his many friends in this province wish him every success.

Halifax Newsman Dies Suddenly

HALIFAX (CP)—Edgar E. Kelley, a dean of Maritime newspaper men and editor in chief of the Halifax Chronicle-Herald and Halifax Mail-Star, died suddenly late Thursday following a heart attack. He was 69.
Mr. Kelley, a director of the Halifax Herald Ltd., and a member of the newspaper's staff since 1912, died several hours after he went home from work in the evening.
He began working with the newspaper two years before he joined the army and spent four years overseas during the First World War. He came back to his editorial job in 1918 and worked up to the city desk, later became sports editor, and finally editor-in-chief.
His newspaper career first began in Saint John, N.B. in 1910 shortly after he completed his education in his native Allandale, N.B.

AMONG THE FARMERS
Federation of Agriculture Newsletter

FIRE FIRE!!
The Federation of Agriculture offices were possibly minor victims in the fiery volcano that erupted in the Co-operative building last Monday. While the Federation loss in material things is a minor one compared with that of the other groups involved, nevertheless it is a major misfortune in that the operations are interrupted at a time when plans had been made for the holding of the school district meetings.
The investment of the members in office equipment was protected with insurance and can be replaced. The files even though they descended with their cabinets into the lower regions have been salvaged and while water soaked can, when dried out, be deciphered. The filing system covering both insurance and membership are saved and in good condition. But there is soon a decision that must be made on the general files which go back over a period of years and are chiefly valuable from a historical standpoint.
Perhaps the most serious loss took place in the reference library which contained a number of books dealing with the early history of farm organizations in this province, and for practical purposes are irreplaceable. To summarize, practically everything the Federation owned was seriously damaged but the more important portions will still serve as a basis for continuing the records of the organization.
MEETING DATES
At the time of the fire the envelopes (over 400) containing the material going out to the secretaries for the meetings which were to have been held on Monday, May 6 were ready for mailing. This material was all destroyed and must now be reprinted which means that the meeting date has now been advanced to Wednesday, May 15.
We would therefore advise members of the Federation and others interested to reserve the 15th of May for the meeting in all school districts when membership and protection will be brought up to date.
INSURANCE
There is nothing like a fire to develop consciousness of the value of insurance. In far too many cases the report of farm fires on Prince Edward Island read either that there was no insurance or there was very little. Farm buildings are very vulnerable to fire, rarely if ever is it possible to control a fire that starts in a barn and it is an exception to bring one under control in a farm house in the usual absence of adequate fire fighting equipment. There are literally thousands of farmers in this province who would be well advised to take a look at their insurance policies and the protection that have in relation to the value of their buildings and their property. It is too late after the fire starts. No one ever had too much insurance after the fire was over.
CHEAP FERTILIZER
About ten days ago we were told by a neighbour that this year was the first spring in twenty years that there had been no water in his house cellar. This indicated that there was very little moisture to any depth in the ground, an observation which was borne out by the fact that roads and fields were drying with remarkable rapidity after an April with little rainfall. Tuesday's rain with Wednesday's snow will be a valuable contribution to restoring moisture levels and to encouraging the growth of grass and clover. A dry, cold and windy May is something to be greatly feared from the standpoint of grass and hay.
CROPPING PROSPECTS
Until the rain on Tuesday and Wednesday there was prospect for the land drying up quite rapidly and getting into conditions for spring cultivation. Now there will likely be a week elapse before even the early birds will start getting restless and consider getting on the land.
FARM POLICY
In theory, most people are expected to vote for the party or candidate who is committed to providing the type of government which will be in the best interest of the public generally. In practice the voter is more apt to be influenced by personal considerations or those of the particular economic group to which he belongs.
Of course all those considerations may be over-looked and the

policy of 'my party right or wrong' adherence to. Farmers have, since confederation, been an influential group of voters, at one time they were numerically important, today while the ratio of farm people to urban people is steadily declining yet one rural vote is still more powerful than the urban vote. Expressed in another way this means that there are more members in parliament per thousand rural voters than per 1,000 urban voters.
If a tendency to be influenced by hereditary party adherence is overlooked the farmer is inclined to be a thoughtful voter and also inclined to put consideration of general welfare ahead of personal ones. Possibly this is one of the reasons why agriculture has not kept pace with development in other industries.
It is not our intention to advise any farmer how he should vote or what party he should vote for. However, we will go so far as to suggest that the thoughtful voter before casting his ballot will attempt to analyze the policies set forth by the different parties in relation to agricultural matters and will then further take a good look for the candidates and appraise their capacity to promote policies beneficial to farming.

MIKOYAN IN VIENNA

VIENNA (Reuters) — Russia's first deputy premier Anastas Mikoyan arrived by air Tuesday for a four-day official visit to Austria. The visit, for talks with government leaders and trips to industrial enterprises, was to have been made last November, but was postponed because of the Hungarian revolt.
