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P. E. I. Doctors Attend Reception At Dalvay

The scene of the P. E. I. Medical Association annual meeting shifted to the auditorium of the Provincial Sanatorium yesterday afternoon where three speakers were heard in brief discussions. Dr. H. Moyle presided.

The "Changing Trends in the Common Acute Infectious Diseases" were briefly outlined by Dr. E. M. Worden, lecturer in Pediatrics at McGill University, Montreal, while Dr. H. M. Coleman, of the Toronto East General and Orthopaedic Hospital, warned doctors to be "careful with fractures".

Dr. C. B. Pierce, Professor of Radiology at McGill, spoke on "The Diagnosis and Management of Early Cancer of the Breast" and his talk was followed by the showing of a color film dealing with the same subject.

Last night the doctors took time out to enjoy the lighter side of a convention. All delegates and their wives were guests at the annual president's reception at Dalvay. A buffet supper and dance filled the evening for them.

The hosts last night were Dr. Harcourt B. Church, president of the Canadian Medical Association, and Dr. J. A. McMillan, president of the P. E. I. Division of the Canadian Medical Association.

Business sessions will be resumed this morning at the Nurses' Residence of the P. E. I. Hospital. They will be featured by the election of officers. Luncheon will be served the doctors in the nurses' dining room where they will be guests of the hospital. Dr. Church will be the guest speaker. In the afternoon they will return to the auditorium of the Sanatorium for the closing clinical sessions.

Inspects P. E. I. Experimental Farm, Stations

Dr. E. S. Hopkins, Director of Experimental Farms, Ottawa visited the Experimental Farm, the Illustration Station at Rose Valley and the Experimental Fox Station at Summerside yesterday.

Dr. Hopkins expressed himself as being well satisfied with the building program at the Experimental Farm, especially the soil fertility projects at Upton Farm.
