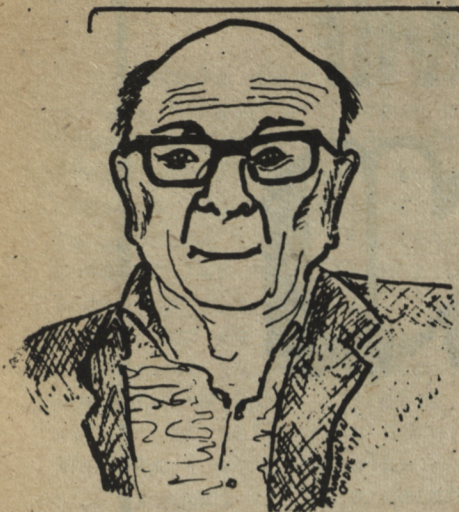


PANTHERS LOSE SEASONAL OPENER

Our football Panthers travelled to Fredericton last Saturday and, for the third year in a row dropped their opening game of the season . . . this time by a close 31-26 margin. While we might say "Close" that

term is of use to razor blade advertisers only. We feel the team are quite justified in their hope that they'll win the return match here on 15 October as the statistics seem to favour them. They gained 249 yards through the air with Rick Kiraly completing 16 passes out of 36 for 249 yards, while his rival Terry Cripotos, made 12 of 24 for 177 yards. On the ground we rushed for 101 yards while the Red Bombers were held to 59. Our total game .. 350 yards, the Red Bombers . . . 236. In punting we were out-scored with an average of 28 yards to their 31. Our touchdowns came in the first half from the Kiraly-Dave MacLeod (Smiley) combination the first on a 27 yard pass to MacLeod and the second as Kiraly went over from the 5 after MacLeod had

run 65 yards on a pass & run play. The first T.D. was set up by an interception by Mike O'Neil. The second half saw two more major scores for us "Good" guys ... the first on a pass to Socky MacDonald, with the last another Kiraly-MacLeod pass to make it close. The other two points came from an exciting two point conversion, Kiraly to Mike Jones. Smiley had almost a hat trick & felt so depressed over his failure to reach that outstanding mark that he is said to have limited his intake, on the return trip to only 5 Quarter Pounders. The next action in football will be at Sackville on Saturday afternoon with the Panthers taking on Mount A. in one that we HAVE to win. First action here will be on the 8th when the X-team come to us. They, by the way, gave an indication of strength as they beat SMU 15-12 while Acadia was romping to a 60-7 win over Mount A.

We note the basketball team has started training under the leadership of George Birger. We welcome George to the local scene and wish him every success. At the same time we should not overlook the fact that he comes late & has had but little time to rebuild a team that should be weakened by the defection of some of last year's players. George has had plenty of experience. He is a native of South Dakota but has had considerable Canadian experience. He was the first basketball coach at Lakehead University and was Athletic Director there until he left on Sabbatical in 1974. From 74-76 he was with Tucson in the Central Hockey League, which is affiliated with both Phoenix and Houston. Besides his other duties he was largely associated with the promotional aspect of the business &, hopefully, he'll be successful in promoting basketball in this province. He faces quite a rebuilding task.

Returning players are Lloyd Pullen, who has

always played well with us since coming here. from Montreal. Lloyd is 6'5" Butch Postma is from Kin-kora, Colin MacAdam and Bruce Nicholson are from Charlottetown and Bill Fanning is from St. John's. All these have played well when they got the chance but, - with last year's team doing so well they saw but little service. The status of Dennis High is at the time of writing, still uncertain. Certainly the 6'10" star would be a welcome member of the team. Newcomers trying out for the team include: Dave Arsenault - 6'2" from Colby College in Maine, Vince Murray from Brooklyn (I'm glad to be on the side of a guy from Brooklyn), Chris Smith 6'8" from Moncton, Kevin Courtney 6'4" from Montreal. Dave Forbes 6'3" from Moncton, Dave Connolly the last of the Charlottetown Basketball family, James Whelan from Souris, Don Fernald from Natick Mass., (Yea Red Sox) Don Jardine from Souris Kevin Hankinson from Middleton and Stephen Richard from St. Jean P.Q. and, (after he is through catching T.D. passes for the Football Panthers) possibly Dave "Smiley" MacLeod. If we omitted any names we're sorry. We'll know them all pretty well by next March. Good luck.

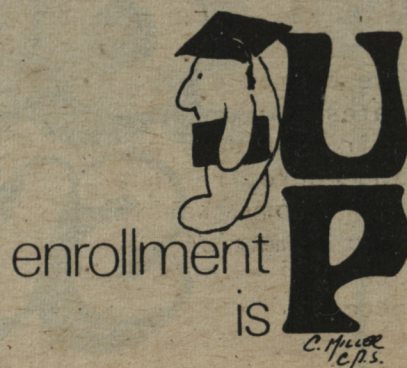
in 1974. The courses Mr. Nemetz teaches include introductory business 100, human relations 371 and a special topics in organizational behavior course 472.
