traffic on the main entrance to the City.

Coun. Johnstone said the Finance committee had spent considerable time examining the workings of the office at City Hall, with the idea in mind that certain expenditures could be curtailed. The Finance Chairman said the Committee was not satisfied with the system of preparing assessment and taxation notices which at the present time had to be done by the staff in overtime hours at a cost of \$3,000 to the City.

Coun. Johnstone said that a new system would be inaugurated that would have the effect of eliminating this overtime. He thought if those delivering the notices made the sortation it might work out just as well as having the staff carry out this work.

A resolution sponsored by Coun. MacDonald asked that Messrs. Roland Heron, Walter Berrigan and Joseph McTague be taken from the payroll of the Public Property Committee.

Coun. O'Neill asked whether it was necessary for the Council to make deletions from the staff of the City departments.

Coun. MacDonald said these men had been carried on the payroll of his Committee for some time and from the best of his knowledge there was no work for them to do. He said he did not object to their being hired by some other department that could use them but he wanted it made official that the Public Property Committee was no longer responsible for their salaries.

Coun. Gormley pointed out that Mr. Heron had been working for the City for the past 16 years as janitor and general clean-up man. He said he was a returned man and felt he should be given some consideration.

Coun. Gaudet said the Finance Committee had made inquiries into Mr. Heron's status and when they had inquired whether he was doing any work which the cleaning woman was not already doing the answer they received was "no".

"That is what we are after; we want to cut out this duplication of service wherever it occurs," Coun. Gaudet added.

Coun. Gormley said he wanted to bring to the attention of the Council the fact that an employee

who had worked for 10 years had been sick for two weeks and as a result had not received his pay for the time he was off duty.

Coun. Gaudet recalled that at a previous meeting of some time ago, the Council had agreed that they would recognize two classes of employees - permanent and casual. He said the employee referred to by Coun. Gormley was a casual employee and was therefore entitled only to the time that he worked.

"I take full responsibility for this action," said Coun. Johnstone "My whole idea is to cut down expenses and frankly I cannot see why we should pay any man who is not working for the city."

Coun. Gaudet said he understood the man in question was one of those who was about to be made a permanent employee. He felt that it was unfortunate that he was caught as he put it, in the squeeze.

Coun. Foster: "He's still a casual laborer."

Coun. Gaudet announced that he had been requested by Coun. McCormac to report progress in the Street Committee's findings regarding job evaluation. On motion it was agreed that the meeting adjourn until Coun. McCormac's return.

WELFARE GRANTS On motion by Coun. Johnstone it was agreed that the Finance Committee be authorized to contact the Provincial Government regarding the arranging of grants to the two welfare bureaus in the City. The understanding is that the Welfare Bureaus will become responsible for the administration of all direct relief within the City.

From henceforth the toilets in the Market section of the civic Centre will be opened on Tuesday and Friday only each week from 8.00 a.m. to 5.00 p.m. The position of lavatory caretaker in the Market Centre will be abolished as of June 1. The lavatories will come under the supervision of the caretaker of the Civic Centre who will receive \$300 per year extra for this work. Previously the salary paid for this job alone was \$1,500 a year.

The tender of F.R. McLaine was accepted for the supplying of a three-ton dump truck with power take-off hoist and box. The cost to the City is \$2,800 plus the present three-ton truck owned by the City.

Each year when the boat is tied up for the winter, the steel floats are removed from the slip and the ramp is tied up to prevent damage from ice. To resume the service it is necessary to replace the floats under the ramp and an exceptional high tide is necessary for them to take the weight.

Workers were hopeful that the tide would rise high enough last night to allow this operation to take place. It has been pointed out that Spring tides occur only every three weeks and it is only on such an occasion that the work can be carried out.

MONTREAL (CP)—Ship movements on the St. Lawrence river between Montreal and Quebec City have been temporarily halted because of dangerous ice flows, shipping officials said here Monday.

The shipping channel is jammed at Sorel, Que., and in Lake St. Peter by ice in Laprairie basin and on the shores of the river breaking off in large floes.

Channel engineers said the present condition could last about a week. They said the icebreakers D'Herbville, Ernest Lapointe and Walter E. Foster have swung into action on Lake St. Peter.

Another very interesting group comprised songs by Satie-Saens ("Happiness is a Fleeting Thing") Debussy ("Beautiful Evening"), Stefano Donaudy, ("Oh My Beloved One") and Musetta's Waltz from Puccini's popular opera "La Boheme".

Modern composers were represented in the final selections, which included "The Black Oak Tree", by John Niles; a negro spiritual, "Didn't It Rain", arranged by Harry Burleigh; "Do not Go, My Love" by Richard Hageman, and "Sing To Me, Sing" by Sidney Homer.
