

Local and Other Items.

Based at the Bank to-night. The Quebec Legislature meets on Thursday next. The mails are crossing from both Capes to-day. Don't forget the Citizens Meeting in Market Hall to-night. Two drunks at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon. EX-ALDERMAN WALSH, of Halifax, died a few days ago in Virginia. FOWLER, one of the oldest and most respected residents of Canterbury, N. S., departed dead while on his way home on Thursday last. He was seventy-eight years of age. It is stated that H. R. H. the Prince of Wales will visit British Columbia next summer or autumn. Probably his His Royal Highness may inspect Canada's great Northwest. THE four tallest Ottawa men are said to be as follows:—Donald Fraser, 6 feet 2 inches; John Grant, 6 feet 3 inches; Richard Morely, 6 feet 4 inches, and Richard Prindeville, 6 feet 5 inches. ON the 11th instant, Sir John Macdonald celebrated his sixty-ninth birthday. He is now said to be the oldest member of the Commons, and every one hears with pleasure of his improved health. A YOUNG man named Arthur A. Underhill, who was about to be married to an estimable young lady of Nelson, N. B., mysteriously disappeared one evening last week. He was last seen in Uthman. MR. CHARLES TOWNSEND, of Sedalia, Mo., had rheumatism of the worst kind. A sea trip was a failure as to renewing his health, and he was going home to die. Mr. John A. Thompson, while sitting at his breakfast table enjoying a meal, was stricken down with heart disease, and died instantly. He was in his fifty-first year. John A. Hoop, of Leicester Street, died suddenly of congestion of the heart. He was seventy-five years of age. THE MOST REV. DR. O'BRIEN will leave tomorrow for Halifax, to cross by the Capes. He will be accompanied by Bishop McIntyre, Rev. A. McGillivray, P. Doyle, D. J. G. McDonald, and Dr. McDonald, of Georgetown. The consecration will take place next Sunday, the Consecrator will be Archbishop Taschereau, of Quebec; Assistant Bishops, Bishops McIntyre and Sweeney; Preacher, Bishop Cameron of Arichat. Besides there will be the Sanctuary Bishop Fabre, of Montreal; and Bishop Rogers, of Uthman. LADY YOUNG, wife of Sir William Young, ex-Chief Justice of this Province, died on Friday. She was the oldest daughter of the late Hon. Michael Tobin. The deceased lady had reached the ripe old age of 79 years, and retained the full vigor of her intellect to the last moment. She was of a generous and amiable disposition, and her memory will be held in affectionate esteem by the people of this city, to whom she was very generally known. We extend our warmest sympathy to Sir William Young in his bereavement.—Herald. THE Halifax City Council has, at length, passed an assessment law similar, in some respect to that of this city. Ald. James Mackintosh and his confederates deserve the thanks of the over-burdened taxpayers of Halifax for the energetic manner in which they fought the matter through, against a most determined and able opposition. Charlottetown has been ahead of its big sister, Halifax, for several years, in the matter of a good assessment law. Halifax loses many thousands of its taxes every year through a bad system of assessment, while we lose scarcely a dollar. ON Tuesday last, a bill was passed in the United States Senate to provide for the presidential succession. It does away with the statute in force ever since 1792, by which in case of the death or inability of the President and Vice President, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House follow in that order, and establishes the succession after the Vice-President in the following rank: The Secretary of State, Secretary of the Treasury, Secretary of War, Attorney-General, Postmaster-General, Secretary of the Navy, and Secretary of the Interior, provided they are qualified under the Constitution and not liable to impeachment. It provides a simple and natural succession to the Presidency, and in case the House adopts it, will do away with the only contingency which has yet arisen in which there has been any possible break in the line of the Presidency.

One Mr. Casey, a member of the Municipality, was arrested among the number. He was charged with conspiracy to murder all the British Government officials in Dublin. Bail in his case has been refused. Two of the persons arrested on Friday night turned approvers, and it is expected that some arrests will shortly be made in connection with the murder of Lord Cavendish and Under Secretary Burke, in Phoenix Park. The Overdank Agitation. ROME, Jan. 15. One hundred and twenty-five arrests were made here, on Friday night, in connection with the Overdank agitation. They will be tried for high treason. Gambetta's Burial. PARIS, Jan. 15. Gambetta will probably be buried at Nice on Saturday. Riots in Dublin. DUBLIN, Jan. 15. A serious riot occurred here on Saturday. 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CIVIC ELECTION BY THE MAYOR. IN pursuance of an Act of the General Assembly of this Island, made and passed in the forty-third year of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intitled "An Act to amend the Act of the Eighteenth Victoria, Chapter thirty-four, intitled 'An Act to incorporate the town of Charlottetown and all Acts amending the same.'" I do hereby give Public Notice that an Election of a Mayor and One Person to Serve as a Common Councillor in the City Council for each Ward of said City, Being in all a MAYOR and FIVE COMMON COUNCILLORS, will be held on WEDNESDAY, the 24th Day of January, A. D. 1883. At the several places, that is to say: In Ward No. 1, at or near the Store of Messrs. J. & T. Morris, corner of Queen and Water Streets. In Ward No. 2, at or near the house of Mr. Thomas Connolly, opposite Mr. R. Hearle's Warehouse, Sidney Street, between Great George and Prince Streets. In Ward No. 3, at or near the Market House. In Ward No. 4, at or near the Fire Engine House, fronting on Kent Street, east, between Weymouth and Cumberland Streets. In Ward No. 5, at or near the House of Widow Tierney, corner of Euston and Great George Streets. And at the said Election the Poll will be opened at nine o'clock in the forenoon, and continue open until five o'clock in the afternoon of the same day. DESCRIPTION OF WARDS. Number One shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Dorchester Street, and the parcel of land formerly known as the Military Barrack Ground. Number Two shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Richmond Street and north of Dorchester Street. Number Three shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Grafton Street and north of Richmond Street. Number Four shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Fitzroy and north of Grafton Streets. Number Five shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies north of Fitzroy Street, including the Common of the said Town. NOMINATION DAY. Act 43, Victoria, Cap 15.—"Seven Days before the time of any and every election for Mayor or Councillors, the Person or Candidates for the office of Mayor or Councillor shall give their names in as such Candidates to the City Clerk, and the City Clerk shall duly enter the names, residences and addresses of such persons, together with the office and wards for which they are candidates, and such entry, when made, shall be deemed nomination for such candidates." There shall be paid by each person so nominated for Mayor, at the same time, a fee of ten dollars, and by each person so nominated as Councillor, a fee of five dollars, which sums shall go toward paying the cost of the election. No person shall be qualified either for the office of Mayor or Councillor unless such nomination be made in manner and at the time aforesaid. The time appointed for the nomination of candidates shall be from the time of twelve at noon, until the hour of four o'clock in the afternoon of the day fixed for that purpose.
